The Lowell Wrestling team placed 2nd overall in the State 1A/2A Championships on February 27th and crowned two more champions for Lowell. Fire District Board Reviews and Reaffirms District Goals

Fire District Board Members reviewed the District's Master Plan and reaffirmed components of the plan while updating other portions of the document. The Master Plan was initially adopted in November of 2005 and has been reviewed and updated annually in January or February of each year.

The Board reaffirmed the current services provided by the District with no change. The services include the following:

- Structural fire suppression (residential & commercial)
- Wildland fire suppression (initial attack non forest fire activities)
- Emergency Medical first response to the advanced life support level
- Public Education Programs (fire prevention & EMS)
- Fire and EMS training and continuing education for District personnel, as well as neighboring agencies
- Limited water rescue
- Limited rope rescue
- Hazardous Materials first response
- Fire & life safety inspections and code enforcement in conjunction with the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office
- Open burning regulation enforcement for Lane Regional Air Protection Agency

Goals were established in two categories listed as those that should be accomplished within two years and those that should be accomplished within five years. The listing of these goals is in no specific order of importance or priority.

Two-Year or Short-Term Goals:

Goal 1: Develop and implement an emergency management response program to address all hazards that might be presented to the district. The plan must comply with and complement all recognized Federal, State and County requirements

Status: In development – As this process and document is a living document, continual update and revisions will occur. Currently working with School District and City to Review and Revise Plan – 1/16

Goal 2: Enhance service delivery in rural areas of the district.

Status: With the new Station 2 in operation, service delivery has been improved in Fall Creek Area through reduced response times. Again this is a continuous process and will be updated regularly. 1/16

Goal 3: Develop and implement a standardized public education program that addresses the specific educational needs of district patrons.

Status: Several programs have been developed and implemented over the past several years. Most of the programs are offered on an as needed basis and proceeding as needed. New programs are developed as the need might arise. This too, is a continuous goal and will be addressed as needed. 1/16

Goal 4: Review and update Board policies, district operational policies and procedures and SOP's. All policies and procedures shall be appropriately codified, published and training shall be provided as needed.

Status: Completed in 2014. Updated as needed. Personnel policy manual is in development. 1/16

Goal 5: Develop and implement a vehicle, facilities and equipment maintenance and replacement plan. The plan shall be fiscally responsible and designed to maintain district assets at optimum levels of service. The plans shall also create specific timelines and funding options for replacement of assets.

Status: Completed and adopted 2010 - Reviewed and revised at least annually. 1/16

Goal 6: Develop and implement a member wellness program that promotes physical as well as mental well-being and fitness.

Status: Completed and implemented 2014 - Reviewed and revised as necessary. 1/16

Goal 7: Develop and implement a recruitment and retention program that generates adequate personnel levels to meet demand.

Status: Partially complete 2014 – Additional programs ongoing. 1/16

Long Range Goals:

Long Range Goals are those that will require several years to accomplish. These goals generally require three to five years to accomplish,

Goal 1: Develop a plan for the relocation of the Fall Creek Station to a more suitable location to accommodate the future development of the Fall Creek area. The Plan shall include a needs assessment, funding plan, acquisition and construction plan, and an operations plan for the facility.

Status: Relocation Complete - Construction plan moving forward - Improvements in progress. 1/16

Goal 2: Develop a plan to identify and implement service enhancement and delivery methods with neighboring fire and EMS agencies. Study efficiencies that may be implemented to accomplish main goal.

Status: Project on hold – Significant progress had been made until changes in neighboring district's caused delay in development and implementation. A service study is currently being conducted by other districts on this issue. Suggest hold until stability is established and study is complete.

Goal 3: Develop and implement a fire and life safety inspection and education program for district commercial structures and businesses.

Status: In progress

Summary

The Master Plan is a road map for the future, an instrument of change and a direction of purpose. Trying to predict the future is difficult and challenging at best. This Master Plan (Strategic Plan) is a living document, intended to be reviewed at least annually, and revised as required. Our organization, community and resources will continue to change as needs arise. Planning for the future is a primary component of our day-to-day operation so that we might help direct the future rather than just react to it.

Fire and emergency activity will tend to remain fairly consistent with the predictable growth of the communities. The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District will continue to provide the best, highly trained fire, medical and rescue force with the resources provided by our patrons.

This plan, by no means, is all inclusive of every project or goal the organization, the Board of Directors, its personnel or the Fire Chief might have for the future. But this plan does express the major goals that will require significant effort and commitment by everyone to meet the needs of the district.

Spring Is Almost Here – Time To Start Thinking About Summer Wildfire Safety

Spring is just around the corner, and with the longer, dryer days we should start thinking about making our homes and property wildfire safe. Here are some things you can get a jump on to help keep your home, out buildings and property, wildfire safe this spring and summer.

- Remove dead or overhanging branches. During the windy conditions that exist during a wildland fire, flames, sparks and firebrands could travel from the tree to the roof of your structure.
- Remove leaf accumulation from your yard. Leaf accumulation provides fuel for a wildland fire.
- Remove leaf clutter from your roof and gutters. During a wildland fire, leaves and needles on the roof and/or in the gutters could be ignited by flying embers.
- Remove tall, dry grasses. Tall, dry grasses provide a path for fire that can lead directly to a house.
- Remove "ladder fuels". Prune tree limbs so the lowest is between 6' 10' from the ground. Fire burning through tall, dry grass could ignite these limbs and climb to the top of the tree with relative ease.
- Check your generator and/or hose to be sure it is in good repair. Refuel garden equipment carefully. Yard equipment needs annual maintenance and proper fueling. Hoses develop leaks and deteriorate with age and exposure. During wildland fire season, fuel your lawn mower properly --away from dry, flammable grasses.
- Prune bushes and shrubs regularly. Remove excess growth as well as dead leaves and branches to decrease their flammability, and the threat they could pose during a wildland fire. Dispose of cuttings and debris promptly, according to local regulations.

School Board to Review Master Plan and Recommendations on March 28th

At its meeting on March 28th, the Lowell School Board will review the Facility Master Plan and recommendations that grew out of the input received by staff and community members. The Board will have the opportunity to discuss the findings and recommendations provided by gLAs Architects, who led the effort. The meeting begins at 6 p.m. in the Professional Development Center at Lundy Elementary, 45 S. Moss Street.

The Master Planning process reviewed and prioritized needs for all Lowell School District facilities in the context of current needs, enrollment and projections for the next decade. The process also addressed the security and safety needs of both schools.

Although the Master Plan document is close to final, community outreach and input is still underway. The District will be holding information sessions in the coming months and will share details of the recommendations on its website, in The Bridge, and via mailed information to our community.
