Firefighters Attend Special Training

Three of our Volunteer Firefighters had the opportunity to attend some special training offered by Union Pacific Railroad. The three-day course was designed to provide training in the mitigation of an incident involving crude oil in a rail transportation environment. The course consisted of classroom instruction and hands on exercises including live fire training. The training was held at the Security and Emergency Response Training Center located in Pueblo Colorado. Union Pacific provided the training, transportation to and from Pueblo and lodging at no cost to the Fire District.

As shipments of crude oil increase on our local rail line, this training is invaluable in helping small organizations such as ours, learn and practice techniques to safely mitigate emergencies involving rail transportation. Members of the Lowell Fire District as well as the Dexter Fire District have taken advantage of this excellent training opportunity. Members will be passing on lessons learned to all the agencies along the Highway 58 corridor.









Fire District Budget Committee Approved Budget

The Fire District Budget Committee held a meeting on May 17th to review the proposed budget for fiscal year 2016-2017. The Budget includes \$726,782 in revenue, with expenditures of equal value. The current tax rate of \$2.697 per \$1,000 is sufficient to fund the district at current levels. 
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Burn Season Reminder

Remember that you only have until June 15th to get all your tree, shrub and yard trimmings burned. The outdoor burn season typically ends June 15th, dependent on weather conditions. For the outdoor burning advisory call Lane Regional Air Protection Agency (LRAPA), burn advisory line at 541-726-3976 Option 3. Outdoor burning is allowed on days designated by LRAPA. Make sure it is a burn day and you are burning authorized material. For more information on outdoor burning call LRAPA at 541-736-1056 or go to www.LRAPA.org.

Use the "Zone Concept" to Help Protect Your Home From Wildfire

The primary goal for FireWise landscaping is fuel reduction — limiting the amount of flammable vegetation and materials surrounding the home and increasing the moisture content of remaining vegetation. The home itself and everything around it up to 100-200 feet is known as the 'home ignition zone.' In areas across the country where the risk of wildfire is high, the home ignition zone extends up to 200 feet beyond the actual home structure. Within this 200 foot area, there are three zones:



Zone 1 encircles the structure and all its attachments

(wooden decks, fences, and boardwalks) for at least 30 feet on all sides. *Note:* the 30-foot number comes from the very minimum distance, on flat ground, that a wood wall can be separated from the radiant heat of large flames without igniting.

Zone 2 is 30-100 feet from the home. Plants in this zone should be low-growing, well irrigated and less flammable.

Zone 3 is 100 to 200 feet from the home and this area should be thinned, although less space is required than in Zone 2. NOTE: Because of other factors such as topography, the recommended distances to mitigate for radiant heat exposure actually extend between 100 to 200 feet from the home – on a site-specific basis.

Download the FireWise Landscaping and Construction Guide which provides a more in-depth look at each zone and the applicable actions steps (within that zone) that homeowners can take to reduce the risk of wildfire damage to their home and property. Summer Camp Offerings in Lowell

As the summer quickly approaches, many families are thinking about summer plans for their children. Lowell School District is excited to announce we will be offering a variety of new summer camps this year, including a Summer Recreation and Fitness Program, Science Camp, Culinary Classes, Multicultural Camp, and Drama Camp. All camps will offer fun and engaging activities to keep children active and learning over the summer.

The Summer Recreation and Fitness Program will run Monday through Friday, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., starting July 5 and ending August 26. The program will be open to all children in current grades 3-6. Children attending the program will participate in primarily outdoor activities, with a different theme for each week. Parents can sign their kids up for the program by filling out and submitting a Participant Registration Form, which will be available in the Lundy Elementary Office. Participants may join the program from start to finish, or just the weeks they wish to attend. Responsible high school students interested in volunteering for the program can also join by filling out a Volunteer Application Form, which can be picked up in the Lowell High School office.

Academic Summer School will begin the week of June 20th for Lundy students and the week of June 27th for High school students. The focus of academic summer school is literacy and math for Lundy students and credit recovery, passing local assessments for graduation, and skill building for high school students.

This year we are expanding our summer camp option for Lowell students. The summer camps include: **Iron Chef Cooking** (sponsored by the Oregon State Extension Service and designed for incoming grades 6th -8th), **Science Camp** (with a focus on costal ecosystems and including field trips to the coast and classes at the Hatfield Marine Science Center), Drama Camp (taught by the high school Drama Teacher, Micah Klatt, and ending with a production for the community), and Multicultural Camp (taught by Dr. Rius who teaches Spanish at the UofO and Lowell High School). More information and applications for these camps will be available on Friday, June 3rd in the Lowell and Lundy offices. The camps will have "caps" and will be filled on a first come first serve basis. Waiting lists will be generated. Contact the Lowell and Lundy offices for more information.

Lowell and Lundy Curriculum Improvements

While a very visible transformation has been happening to the physical appearance of Lowell and Lundy over the past three years, changes and improvements to the student curriculum and teaching methods are also happening.

Curriculum Improvements at Lundy: Lundy has new curriculum in reading, writing, social studies, and most recently, the school board approved updated curriculum in math. This year teachers piloted a math program that incorporates both print material and on-line work. Next year, all students will have access to computers to help facilitate the on-line learning component of the math curriculum. Parents will also be able to access the on-line curriculum to help students improve math skills if necessary. Science will also have an increased focus next year as teachers incorporate the "New Generation Science Standards" within their curriculum.

Curriculum Improvements at Lowell Jr./Sr. High School: The addition of the GEAR UP grant has been instrumental in helping students visit college campuses, go to summer camps, attend summer and Saturday School, and access scholarships and financial aid. At Lundy, all students are welcome to increase their skills through the after school program called "power hour" and at Lowell, academic tutoring is available to all students Monday through Thursday after school. Recently, Lowell has added voluntary "Saturday School" for students wanting help with state exam preparation (as shown below).



Our staff continues to hone their teaching skills and have been able to access multiple professional development opportunities. Indeed this is a great time to be a student in the Lowell School District! Every student is known and valued for what they contribute to our school and community.

Mowing Season

Mowing season is now in full swing and the City of Lowell wants to remind residents about our noxious vegetation code. The Lowell Revised Code Section 5.120 Noxious Vegetation identifies the following as noxious vegetation:

- Poison oak and poison ivy
- Blackberry bushes that extend into a public thoroughfare or across a property line
- Vegetation that is a health, fire, or traffic hazard
- Weeds or grass more than 12 inches in height
- Weeds or grass going to seed

Yards with noxious vegetation are subject to civil citation and abatement. This also includes mowing and trimming adjacent public right-of-way in the front, side, or rear yard to the street. For parcels one acre or larger, noxious vegetation is only required to be controlled within 20 feet from adjoining developed property.

To simplify compliance, we are following the same code enforcement process that we use for other common violations, such as accumulations of garbage and inoperable vehicles. This process is as follows:

- Property inspection conducted. Courtesy door hanger reminder will be placed providing 10 days to correct the violation.
- First follow-up inspection. Properties will be mailed a formal warning providing 10 days to correct the violation.
- Second follow-up inspection. Properties may be issued a citation (Class C \$50-250) and a notice of intent to abate the violation. An additional 10 days will be provided to protest the violation.
- Third follow-up inspection. Properties may be abated with the costs of administration and abatement assessed to the property owner and/or renter.

The vast majority of code enforcement complaints are resolved through public education and awareness. Citation and abatement are only intended to be used as a last resort to ensure compliance. Property owners or renters that may be unable to correct the violations due to physical disability should contact City Hall to discuss special arrangements.
