

Don't Let Your Home Fall Victim to Wildfire

We have been fairly lucky so far this summer, when it comes to the super hot days (95 degrees and above) and low humidity and the likelihood of wildfire threats. Sometimes that makes us less diligent of fire safety and forgetful that wildfires are still a great possibility as the summer rolls on. Here is a reminder of the things you can do to reduce the likelihood of property damage from a quick moving wildfire.

- Is your address clearly visible from the road? If you need an address marker, contact the District office to obtain one.
- Is your driveway/roadway clear of obstructions, can a fire engine or other emergency vehicles get to your home? Driveways/ roadway surfaces need to be at least 12 feet wide and have at least 13-1/2 feet height clearance so the emergency vehicles can get to your home. Curves must be of adequate dimension to allow for emergency vehicle clearance, and there must be room for vehicles to turn around.
- Remove limbs and branches that overhang your roof. Prune lower limbs to a height of 15 feet and thin trees or remove them from within 30 feet of your home.
- Keep your roof and gutters free of debris, leaves, needles, small branches and moss.
- Keep woodpiles, firewood and other combustibles at least 30 feet from your home and outbuildings.
- Block off openings under your home and decks with solid sheeting or fine-mesh wire, 1/8th inch metal screen works best. Screen attic vents and louvers also.
- Use only fire resistive roofing an all buildings. Class A asphalt shingles, metal or tile.
- Develop an escape plan and an emergency action plan. If a wildfire occurs near your home, you should have a plan for evacuation that includes important personal items and escape routes. Build an emergency evacuation kit that you can easily take with you if you are asked to evacuate your property in an emergency.

LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move ...

All District Registration on August 9th and 10th

The 2016-2017 school registration will be on August 9th from 5:00 pm – 8:00 pm and August 10th from 8:30 am – 12:00 pm. Students must re-register every year to update student records. Student fees at the High School and Junior High can be paid during that time and sports medical records can be updated. There are no student fees for Lundy students. Registration and athletic forms are also available online on the Lowell District website under the "forms" heading. (www.lowell.k12.or.us)

All Day Kindergarten

Lowell School District will again be offering all day Kindergarten. The Kindergarten schedule will be the same as the older Lundy students with a large portion of their afternoon involved in enrichment and intervention programs.

Before School Enrichment/After School Enrichment and Power Hour

For parent convenience, before and after school enrichment programs will be offered at Lundy. Morning Enrichment will begin at 7:00 am until school starts and afternoon care begins at 3:00 pm until 6:00 pm. The cost of morning care is \$50.00/month or a \$5.00 drop-in fee and the cost of afternoon care is \$180.00/month or a \$15.00 drop-in fee. There are price reductions for the month of December and June, and a 10% sibling reduction. The child care fee will be waived entirely for any additional children after the second child. Power Hour is still available for students needing a boost in their academic skill development. Any family participating in after school care will have the morning care fee waived.

New Course Offerings and Activities for High School Students

This year we will be offering a new advanced biology course and one new AP math course (AP Statistics). Our online credit recovery and special interest courses through Odesseyware will continue to be offered.

In addition to the excellent selection of courses at Lowell, co-curricular opportunities are abundant at our schools. Students have the opportunity to participate on championship athletic teams as well as award winning programs in music. Students are welcome to attend Drama Club and Dance Club. Lundy students interested in these clubs may contact the advisor (Micah Klatt for Drama, and Heidi Sawitzke for Dance) to determine if the club is a good fit.

Jr./Sr. High School Tutoring

After school tutoring in subject areas will begin the week of September 11th with English tutoring on Monday, math tutoring on Tuesday, science tutoring on Wednesday, and social studies tutoring on Thursday. This fall, students involved in athletics will participate in special homework work time on Monday-Wednesday before practice. When athletes can demonstrate maintaining a "C" or better grade in all of their classes, they will be excused from tutoring.

Student Schedules at the High School Available Beginning on August 23rd

Student Schedules for Jr./Sr. High Students will be available on August 23rd. If students would like to see their schedules prior to the start of school, they may pick them up at the High School office August 23rd- 26th between 8:30 am and 2:30 pm. Schedules are based on forecast information and courses needed for graduation. Students requesting a class change will need to fill out a "course change" request form and possibly meet with Ms. Graham.

September 6th Open House and Barbeque

Back to School Means Sharing the Road

School days can bring congestion, even in the small town of Lowell: buses are picking up children, kids on bikes are hurrying to get to school, parents are trying to drop their kids off before work. It's never more important for drivers to slow down and pay attention than when kids are present – especially before and after school. The National Safety Council provides the following guidance to help keep kids safe this school year:

If You're Dropping Off

Schools often have very specific drop-off procedures for the school year. Make sure you know them for the safety of all kids. According to the National Safe Routes to School program, more children are hit by cars near schools than at any other location. The following apply to all school zones:

- Don't double park; it blocks visibility for other children and vehicles
- Don't load or unload children across the street from the school
- Carpool to reduce the number of vehicles at the school

Sharing the Road with Young Pedestrians

According to research by the National Safety Council, most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related incidents are 4 to 7 years old, and they're walking. They are hit by the bus, or by a motorist illegally passing a stopped bus. A few precautions go a long way toward keeping children safe:

- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path of traffic
- Stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
- Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas

- Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way

Sharing the Road with School Buses

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

- Never pass a bus from behind or from either direction if you're on an undivided road if it is stopped to load or unload children
- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus
- Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and tend to ignore hazards and take risks

By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.
