Did you know? Recent Plumbing Mishaps Demonstrate Need for Renovation

You may have heard that a corroded sewage pipe collapsed in the high school basement (pictured at right) which resulted in thousands of dollars in damage (almost forcing cancellation of our Hall of Fame dinner!) and that wires in a junction box under the school caught on fire and could have easily sent the building up in flames. (Luckily Lowell grad Jason Prenevost happened to be under the building and spotted the problem just in the nick of time.) More recently, a pipe that supplies water to the Lundy cafeteria and PDC sprang a leak, forcing the shutdown of restroom facilities in parts of the elementary school. Luckily



the City of Lowell's public works director Max Baker was on hand to swap out a worn meter and get the water back on. Unfortunately, these incidents are just small indicators of the potential problems the District will face in the future if renovations to the infrastructure are not tackled soon. City Beat

City Committees Reorganized

On September 20, 2016 the Lowell City Council adopted Ordinance 294 which restructured the committees of the City. The goal of the ordinance is to enhance public engagement, transparency, and representation through establishing clear and consistent guidelines for each committee. The following changes were adopted:

- All committees were moved to the same code section (2.600-2.627)
- General requirements were established for the selection of members, terms of office, vacancies, removal, duties and responsibilities, temporary committees, subcommittees, public meetings, and presiding officers
- Specific requirements were established for each committee, including membership requirements, terms, powers and duties, and reporting requirements (summarized below)

Budget Committee

- \Rightarrow Term: 3 years
- ⇒ Membership (10): 5 Lowell City Council members, 5 Lowell residents
- \Rightarrow Powers/Duties: Review and approve the annual budget
- \Rightarrow Reporting: None

Planning Commission

- \Rightarrow Term: 3 years
- ⇒ Membership (5): 4 Lowell residents, 1 member may reside within the Lowell Urban Growth Boundary, no more than 2 members from the same occupation, business, trade or profession
- ⇒ Powers/Duties: Review and make recommendations on planning, zoning, and development
- \Rightarrow Reporting: Annual report due January 31

Parks and Recreation Committee

- \Rightarrow Term: 2 years
- ⇒ Membership (5): 4 Lowell residents, 1 member may be less than 18 years of age, 1 member may be a non-resident
- ⇒ Powers/Duties: Advise City Council on parks development, maintenance, and recreation programming
- \Rightarrow Reporting: Annual report due January 31

Library Committee

- \Rightarrow Term: 2 years
- ⇒ Membership (5): 3 Lowell residents, 2 members may be non-residents
- ⇒ Powers/Duties: Operate and maintain the library, establish policy, and advise on the budget, funding, and use
- \Rightarrow Reporting: Annual report due January 31

Economic Development Committee

- \Rightarrow Term: 2 years
- ⇒ Membership (5): 3 Lowell residents, 1 member may represent a local business, 1 member may represent the Lowell School District, 1 member may represent the Lowell Fire District
- ⇒ Powers/Duties: Advise City Council on business creation, retention, expansion and ventures that enhance quality of life
- \Rightarrow Reporting: Annual report due January 31

Blackberry Jam Festival Committee

- \Rightarrow Term: 2 years
- ⇒ Membership (5): 5 members from Lowell, Dexter, Trent, Fall Creek or Unity
- \Rightarrow Powers/Duties: Organize and operate the annual BBJ Festival
- \Rightarrow Reporting: Annual report due August 31

The City of Lowell is now accepting applications for each committee and all interested residents and non-residents (as applicable) are encouraged to apply. Applications may be picked up at City Hall or downloaded online at www.ci.lowell.or.us. *The deadline for applications is November 30*.

The City of Lowell is soliciting applications for Municipal Judge. This position is appointed by the City Council to serve a four-year term commencing on January 1, 2017 and requires a license to practice law in the State of Oregon by the Oregon Supreme Court. Applications are due by November 15th and may be picked up at Lowell City Hall, located at 107 East Third Street, Lowell, OR 97452.

FALL CREEK RESERVOIR DEEP DRAWDOWN & DRONE STUDY

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers plans to conduct a deep drawdown of Fall Creek Reservoir to its near-original stream channel, in early November. The Corps has lowered the reservoir down to 685 feet above sea level each fall in the past five years to give juvenile spring Chinook salmon a better chance of finding the dam's regulating outlets and passing through them safely. Corps monitoring has indicated that juvenile salmon survival rate has been as high as 99% during prior deep drawdowns. Downstream residents may observe increased turbidity during the drawdown, but most of the accumulated sediment and other materials have already passed through the dam.

The reservoir will be closed to all boating - including kayaking, rafting and canoeing - to protect the public from safety hazards around the dam, November 1, 2016 to February 1, 2017. Oregon Parks and Recreation Department boat ramps on the reservoir are routinely closed during the winter months, so impacts to the boating public should be minor.

Additionally, Fall Creek visitors and local residents may notice a drone flying over the drained reservoir during the drawdown. The U.S. Geological Survey may contract a drone to take photos of the lakebed for research purposes. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers does not permit drone use above Corps dams and reservoirs without permission.

Training Station Improvements Continue

Another addition to the Fire District Training Station is nearing completion. The 20-foot container has been placed on top of the two 40-foot containers to add a second floor to the training facility. Future plans include building an interior stairway to provide access to a second floor just as it would be in a two-story home. A pitched roof will be added to the area over the single ground level container to provide an area to practice roof operations and ventilation techniques. The second story container roof will have a railing to allow for steep angle rescue practice and the ability to utilize rope rescue repelling and lifting techniques as well as ladder operations for a two-story home. Is Your Chimney Clean and Ready for Winter?

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves and other fuel-fired appliances as primary heat sources in their homes. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the fire risks when heating with wood and solid fuels. Nationally heating fires account for 36% of all residential home fires in rural areas every year. Often these fires are due to creosote buildup in chimneys and stovepipes. All home heating systems require regular maintenance to function safely and efficiently. The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District encourages everyone to practice the following fire safety steps to keep those home fires safely burning.

Keep Fireplaces and Wood Stoves Clean

- Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist.
- Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations and flammable materials.
- Leave glass doors open while burning a fire. Leaving the doors open ensures that the fire receives enough air to ensure complete combustion and keeps creosote from building up in the chimney.
- Close glass doors when the fire is out to keep air from the chimney opening from getting into the room. Most glass fireplace doors have a metal mesh screen which should be closed when the glass doors are open. This mesh screen helps keep embers from getting out of the fireplace area.
- Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces that do not have a glass fireplace door.
- Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- Keep air inlets on wood stoves open, and never restrict air supply to fireplaces. Otherwise you may cause creosote buildup that could lead to a chimney fire.
- Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves.
- Never use flammable liquids to start a fire.
- Use only seasoned hardwood. Soft, moist wood accelerates creosote buildup.
- Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke.
- Never burn cardboard boxes, trash or debris in your fireplace or wood stove.
- When building a fire, place logs at the rear of the fireplace on an adequate supporting grate.
- Never leave a fire in the fireplace unattended. Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container outside your home when cleaning the firebox.

Each year fire claims the lives of 3,500 Americans, injures 18,300, and causes billions of dollars worth of damage. People living in rural areas are more than twice as likely to die in a fire than those living in mid-sized cities or suburban areas. The neglect and misuse of wood stoves, portable space heaters and kerosene heaters are especially common risks in rural areas.
