# **Building Program Update - Completion of Planning Phase One**

May is the end of the first planning phase of the building program, following the input from the users and experts on the design and specifications that will be used in developing the complete set of plans and specifications. On May 14<sup>th</sup> a meeting will be held with the Experts to receive their critique or suggestions on the specifications and design components. May 31<sup>st</sup> will be a briefing of the Users, reflecting the input received by the Experts.

During the summer, we will begin to work on projects that are simple and can be done in-house or with limited specifications. The focus will be on security improvements. For example, replacing the front door at Lundy Elementary and creating an electronic monitoring of the door, once school opens, and the placement of security fencing at Lowell High School. Phase Two of the planning phases will begin on May 31<sup>st</sup> and conclude on September 24<sup>th</sup>, with action to be taken by the Board of Directors on the design development and the estimation of costs for the building program. We will meet with the Expert Group to seek their advice on August 13<sup>th</sup> in preparation for the September Board meeting.

# Lowell High School Parking Lot

### Saturday, May 5, from 9:00-12:00

This year's event will include the parks cleanup, containers for residents to dispose of household items and yard waste (see acceptable materials below), and the Lowell PTO can and bottle drive. Volunteers are asked to wear work clothes and gloves. Juice and donuts will be available in the morning, and lunch will be served at the end of the event. An alternate date for bad weather will be scheduled if there is a rain out.

#### Acceptable Materials

- Plastics (i.e. lawn chairs, toys)
- Recyclable bottles and cans
- Cardboard
- Scrap metal
- Furniture
- Bagged clothing
- Ink cartridges (no cracks or leaks)
- Clean appliances
- Tires (limit of 4, no larger than 17 in.)
- Small electronics
- Yard debris, including tree limbs (less than 6" diameter and 10' in length, leaves, and similar garden waste

#### **Unacceptable Materials**

- Household garbage
- Construction or commercial waste
- Fluorescent lights
- Alkaline batteries
- Household chemicals
- Computers, monitors, and TVs
- Dirt or sod waste
- Animal waste
- Herbicides, fertilizers, or insecticides
- Treated logs or lumber
- Stumps or stump grindings

#### Yard of the Month Program

This month the Lowell Parks and Recreation Committee is starting a Yard of the Month Program. The goal of the program is to award and recognize the efforts of Lowell residents who take pride in their home and landscape, while inspiring others to do the same. More information on the program is provided below:

#### Award Information

- 1. The Parks and Recreation Committee will select one home each month.
- 2. The Committee will judge only the portion of the yard viewed from the street.
- 3. The Yard of the Month program will start in May and end in October.
- 4. The Committee will place a Yard of the Month sign in each winning yard for a month.
- 5. Each resident may nominate any yard and landscape within the City, including their own.
- 6. Each yard may only win the Yard of the Month award once in a calendar year.
- 7. City Council and staff are ineligible for the program.

#### **Evaluation Criteria**

The Parks and Recreation Committee will use the following criteria when choosing a Yard of the Month. These are only guidelines and the Committee will make a final decision based on the evidence that shows the homeowner's pride in his or her yard:

- Yard is well-groomed; Landscape is attractive, with a variety of plants, shrubs, trees and materials
- Buildings, fences, porches, and patios on the property are in good repair
- Yard is free of litter, junk and debris (no appliances or indoor furniture on porches/patios)
- Yard is free of inoperable or junked motor vehicles
- House numbers are displayed attractively
- Extra consideration may be given to properties that have invested extra effort using attractive art pieces, potted plants, birdhouses, patio or lawn furniture, windsocks, or decorative mailboxes

#### **Nominations**

To nominate a yard, please send an email to yardofthemonth@ci.lowell.or.us with the property address. Nominated property owners will be contacted and may elect to withdraw from consideration. Staff will take photographs of participating properties and submit to the Parks and Recreation Committee for review and consideration.

#### Award

A specially designed "Yard of the Month" sign placed in the winning front yard for one month, a certificate of recognition to the homeowner signed by the Mayor and presented at a Council meeting.

#### **Board and Committee Vacancies**

### Lowell City Council Actions

#### At the April 3rd study session, the following topics were addressed:

- St. Vincent de Paul presented a request to release Lots 11 & 12 for sale outside the HOYOP
- Additional information was provided on the significant water leak that occurred in November 2017
- DLCD Grant Agreement for the Downtown Master Plan was presented
- Procurement Process for Downtown Master Plan Consultant was discussed
- Liquor License Renewal Application Notification from OLCC was presented
- Community Grant Program Applications from Dexter Lake Farmers Market to purchase canopies and from the Pine Needlers Quilt Group to purchase stands to display quilts at the BBJ Festival were presented
- Resolution 694—Authorizing the Deferral of System Development Charges was discussed
- City Administrator informed the Council that the Economic Development Committee would like to work with Rural Development Initiative to develop a Chamber of Commerce for the surrounding area

Study sessions are held for the City Council to receive background information on City business and to give Council members an opportunity to ask questions and express their individual views. No decisions are made, and no votes are taken on any agenda item. Although the public is invited to attend, there is generally no public comment period.

- Approved Resolution 694 Deferral of System Development Charges
- Approved Resolution 695—Budget Transfers
- Approved the Parks and Recreation Committee's recommendation to provide \$2,000 to support the 2018 Lowell School District Summer Recreation Program
- Approved the Economic Development Committee's recommendation to approve a \$30,000 grant from DLCD to develop a Downtown Master Plan
- Approved the Economic Development Committee's recommendation to request a proposal from the Lane Council of Governments for the development of the Lowell Downtown Master Plan.


#### Vacation Bible School Coming in June
