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
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## LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the *Move*...

### Lowell Students Build Leadership Skills at GEAR UP Camp

GEAR UP conducted a Leadership Summer Camp at the U of O in August, and 20 Lowell Jr. High and Sr. High students attended, focusing on the building of community, leadership skills, goal attainment and the development of proactive learning habits.

Seeds Training personnel led various hands-on workshops including integrity, the foundation of great leadership, building trust, and the colorblind challenge which stressed some key lessons about effective communication, such as asking questions and listening first. The principle lesson during coaching and mentoring is to focus one's attention on listening before speaking because listening first helps with attaining valuable information and gaining rapport; thus, giving your mentor a sense of being valued.

### Security Cameras Installed

The City of Lowell is in the process of installing security cameras in Rolling Rock Park and Paul Fisher Park. Upon completion, public areas will be covered with high definition cameras, which include night vision and an off-site backup. The goal of the project is to deter vandalism and increase safety in our parks and open spaces. Cameras will not be monitored, however, in accordance with City policy, footage of any vandalism or other alleged criminal conduct may be released to the Lane County Sheriff's Office for investigation.



### Back to School Means Sharing the Road

School days can bring congestion, even in the small town of Lowell: buses are picking up children, kids on bikes are hurrying to get to school, parents are trying to drop their kids off before work. It's never more important for drivers to slow down and pay attention than when kids are present – especially before and after school. The National Safety Council provides the following guidance to help keep kids safe this school year:

#### *If You're Dropping Off*

Schools often have very specific drop-off procedures for the school year. Make sure you know them for the safety of all kids. According to the National Safe Routes to School program, [more children are hit by cars near schools than at any other location](#). The following apply to all school zones:

- Don't double park; it blocks visibility for other children and vehicles
- Don't load or unload children across the street from the school
- Carpool to reduce the number of vehicles at the school

#### *Sharing the Road with Young Pedestrians*

According to research by the National Safety Council, most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related incidents are 4 to 7 years old, and they're walking. They are hit by the bus, or by a motorist illegally passing a stopped bus. A few precautions go a long way toward keeping children safe:

- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you, as this could put them in the path of traffic
- Stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
- Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas
- Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way

#### *Sharing the Road with School Buses*

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

- Never pass a bus from behind – or from either direction if you're on an undivided road – if it is stopped to load or unload children
- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus
- Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and tend to ignore hazards and take risks

By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones .

### Fire Protection

The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District Board of Directors would like the Lowell Fire District to know that they appreciate the community's support. It has been brought to their attention that there are a few households within our boundaries that may not be protected by fire services. We would like to reach out to you and give any information that may be needed if you are interested in this service.

In the past we had a higher ISO rating that may not have made it practical for some. We have recently had a change in that ISO rating and offer a Class 4 rating to about 98% of the District. If you are not sure if you are covered or if you would like more info please contact Chief Dragt at Lowell Fire Main Station 541-937-3393 or by email at [dragt2300@gmail.com](mailto:dragt2300@gmail.com). All households within the Fire District are covered for Medical Emergencies separately and this will not affect that coverage.

### Fire Restrictions

There seems to have been a lot of confusion when it comes to Fire Restrictions. Lowell Fire District follows Eastern Lane ODF Fire Restrictions. Some of this confusion comes from the two different rating systems. There is a Residential Fire Restriction and an Industrial Fire Restriction. We want our community to be as safe as possible. Thank you for your dedication to making sure that Lowell is a safe community for all.

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### September at the Farmers Market

Dexter Lake Farmers and Crafters market is open Sundays, noon to 4, in Rolling Rock Park through September 30. We invite you to visit and partake of the abundance of the time of year. We asked our farmers what products they will be selling in this final month.

Joel Hucka from Circle H farm in Dexter says he'll be there at every market, either in his own booth or leaving produce for the consignment booth to sell. He'll have garlic, winter squash, leeks, onions, cherry tomatoes, eggplant, and more.

Circle H Farm is providing a new service for your convenience. Go to their website, [circlehorganicfarm.com](http://circlehorganicfarm.com), to find a list of their current offerings. Make your order on-line for fresh food on your table as needed.

Phil Robbins makes smoothies and other fun treats at the market; he also brings a side-line of fresh vegetables and berries. He expects to be selling cherry tomatoes, zucchini, green beans, fall greens, brussel sprouts, and other items. He has some nice late strawberries but their availability depends on the weather.

Eden Garden, with farmers Alison Adams and Tom Weinart, is fairly new to this area, reliably bringing in their products. They will set up their booth every Sunday through the last market day on Sept. 30 and expect to have duck eggs, fall greens, sweet corn (probably through 9/16), blue corn, potatoes, tomatoes, carrots, cilantro and other herbs, green beans, and more. Tom farmed/marked his products in a farmers market in eastern Washington for 20 years.

Our consignment booth sells food and crafts for local farmers, gardeners, and crafters. Our farmers can sell there rather than miss a market if needed. Recently we have been featuring ample supplies of a wide variety of peppers, squash, garlic, sweet corn, and much more from the Nexus community garden. Nexus is a program of Lowell High School which offers students experience raising and selling plants, getting and keeping a job, and other important life skills. We expect more fresh veggie offerings from Nexus in the next few weeks.

When you visit the market, take time to talk to your farmers. Let them know what your needs are and what locally grown foods you like. Bring your patience along because at times they are busy selling. They will be happy to meet you and hear what you have to say.
