


## Fire District Reminds Everyone to be "Wildfire Safe"

Yes, Fire Season is once again upon us and the Lowell Fire District would like to remind everyone that there are a number of ways property owners and tenants can reduce the likelihood of wildfires. There are also a number of ways to reduce the chance of your home or out buildings falling victim to a spreading wildfire should one occur.

To help prevent wildfire damage create a "DEFENSIBLE SPACE" around your home by keeping grass and shrubs cut to a height of less than six inches around your structures. Keep grass and shrubs well irrigated and green to make them less susceptible to fire. Keep combustibles away from structures, keep fir needles and branches clear of roofs and gutters. And remember, outdoor burning is prohibited this time of year due to fire danger.

#### Lowell City Council Actions

This report of actions taken by the Lowell City Council is a regular feature of this newsletter and is provided to inform citizens of recent decisions made by the council.

#### From the July 1st regular meeting:

- Approved Intergovernmental Agreement for Operational Maintenance (Streets) Service with Lane County.
- Approved agreement for Law Enforcement Services with Oakridge.
- Accepted City Administrator's resignation and approved contacting former CA candidate Bill Lee to determine his interest in an interim position.
- Approved motion to confer with the city attorney to compose CA Hamilton's severance agreement. All motions were approved unanimously by: Paulson, Rennert, Burford, Knokey and Reese.

#### From the July 7th regular meeting:

- Approved a motion to enter into negotiations with Bill Lee for the CA Pro Tem position if he wishes to apply for the position.
- Approved a motion for the Mayor to execute the contract subject to review by the City Attorney.
- Approved a motion to direct the Mayor to execute the CH2M Hill contract for one more month. All motions were approved unanimously by: Paulson, Rennert, Burford, Knokey and Reese.

#### From the July 15th regular meeting:

- Approved a motion to authorize the CA to begin work on establishing a long-term contract for Public Works operations.
- Accepted resignation of the Finance Clerk, Lucie Swarm.

#### **Annual Code Enforcement Inspection Scheduled**

City staff will begin its Annual City-wide code enforcement starting the 1<sup>st</sup> of September. This inspection will identify properties that do not meet Lowell code regarding nuisances, noxious vegetation, vehicles and any other code violations that is readily apparent. City staff will **not** enter private property and will only be identifying violations that are clearly visible from a public street or alley. Those properties in violation will be sent a letter identifying the violation and be required to correct the violation within 10 days of being notified.

The staff will be inspecting primarily for the following:

- Accumulations of garbage, junk and debris clearly visible from a street or alley.
- Vegetation that needs to be cut back so that it doesn't impact use of sidewalks or streets.
- Tall grass which needs to be cut and weeds which are going to seed.
- Blackberry vines that extend into a public street or across a property line.
- Dismantled vehicles or vehicle parts stored on
- private property in clear view of the street.
- Unregistered or inoperable vehicles parked within the public right-of-way.

Copies of the ordinances which establish the standards that are expected to be met and identify what constitutes a violation are available at City Hall or on the City's website <u>www.ci.lowell.or.us</u> under the Government Page. #### **Summer Water Safety Reminder**

Whether at home or enjoying our local waterways, it is always important to keep safety in mind when in or near water. Drowning can happen at any time of year, but be especially cautious during the summer months when drowning incidents can increase by as much as 89% as compared to the rest of the year.

When the weather turns warm, as it is now, everyone naturally wants to be in or around the water to help stay cool. Hanging out at the pool or the lake on a hot day is a great way to beat the heat. For people between the ages of 5 and 24, drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death.

It doesn't have to be that way, though. Most water-related accidents could be avoided by knowing how to stay safe and following a few simple guidelines. Learning how to swim is essential if you plan on being on or near water. Many organizations provide swim instruction to folks of all ages, check to see what classes are available in our area.

Here are some Swim Smart ideas:

- Alcohol and Water DO NOT MIX. Anytime you are on or near the water, stay sober. A leading cause of boating accidents is due to alcohol being on board. And I don't mean just on board the boat. Just like driving a car, drinking alcohol and driving a boat can cause disaster as well as land you in jail.
- "Buddy up!" Always swim with a partner, every time whether you're swimming in a backyard pool or in a lake. Even experienced swimmers can become tired or get muscle cramps, which might make it difficult to get out of the water. When people swim together, they can help each other or go for help in case of an emergency.



- Get skilled and be prepared. Learning some life-saving skills, such as CPR and rescue techniques, can help you save a life. A number of organizations offer free classes for both beginning and experienced swimmers and boaters.
- Know your limits. Swimming can be a lot of fun but if you're not a good swimmer or you're just learning to swim, don't go in water that's so deep you can't touch the bottom and don't try to keep up with skilled swimmers. That can be hard, especially when your friends are challenging you but it's a pretty sure bet they'd rather have you safe and alive.
- Swim in safe areas only. It's a good idea to swim only in places that are supervised by a lifeguard. No one can anticipate changing currents, sudden storms, or hidden underwater dangers. In the event that something does go wrong, lifeguards are trained in rescue techniques. Recognize that swimming in an open body of water (like a river, lake, or ocean) is a lot different than swimming in a pool. You need more energy to handle the currents and other changing conditions in the open water.
- Some areas with extremely strong currents are off limits when it comes to swimming. Do your research so you know where not to swim, and pay attention to any warning signs posted in the area.
