GEAR UP Grant to be Received over Seven Years

Last week the Lowell School District was informed that Lowell Jr./Sr. High School was selected to participate in the latest round of "GEAR UP" grants offered to rural schools. GEAR UP stands for "Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs". The mission of the grant program is to increase the number of low-income students who are prepared to enter and succeed in some type of postsecondary education. This particular GEAR UP grant will serve a cohort of students beginning in this year's 7th grade class and follow the cohort through their first year of postsecondary education.

The funds provided by the grant will help all students in grades 7-12 and will be used to enhance Lowell's College and Career Center, increase student awareness of postsecondary programs, help the school to design a seamless process for students wishing to attend colleges and trade schools, and better equip students for the rigors of training and education after high school. Affiliation with GEAR UP will help students get scholarships to attend institutes of higher learning and skill development.

The focus of the Oregon GEAR UP program is to:

- **Reach Higher:** All students, teachers, and community members develop the mindset that all students should and can improve academic performance and have high expectations for students.
- **Increase Rigor**: All students take challenging classes that cause them to put real effort in their academic studies and even graduate high school with some college credit earned through rigorous high school classes.
- **Improve School Relevancy**: Students see a bright future and see the importance and meaningfulness of the classes they take.
- **Develop Relationships**: Teachers and the community build strong ties with students helping them reach their full potential and setting the expectation that they will attend a postsecondary program.
- Raise Awareness of College Options: Students who understand the enrollment process, admissions and scholarships related to postsecondary schooling are much more likely to choose that as a pathway.

Receiving the GEAR UP grant is an important step to helping all students be better prepared for their future. The timeline of the grant provides opportunity for Lowell Jr./Sr. to, over the next seven years, formalize processes that will help student be successful beyond high school. Stay tuned as details concerning the grant will unfold during the coming year.

Get Prepared

As the summer months come to a close and the weather starts to let us know that fall is here, it is a good time to start thinking about and preparing for winter storms that can cause some major inconvenience and down right disastrous conditions. Now is the time to get prepared for local disasters that might occur during the winter months. The first order of business should be to build an emergency kit that can keep you and your family supplied for at least 72 hours. Here is a suggested kit that you can build at home and store in a medium to large size "tote" container for use if disaster should strike. Be prepared to improvise and use what you have on hand to make it on your own for at least three days, maybe longer. While there are many things that might make you more comfortable, think first about fresh water, food and clean air.

Recommended Supplies to Include in a Basic Kit:

- Water one gallon per person per day, for drinking and sanitation
- Non-perishable Food at least a three-day supply
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlights and extra batteries, seal the batteries in containers to reduce moisture and help prevent corrosion
- First Aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Filter mask or cotton t-shirt, to help filter the air
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener if kit contains canned food
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Important Family Documents
- Items for unique family needs, such as daily prescription medications, infant formula or diapers

Consider two kits. In one, put everything you will need to stay where you are and make it on your own. The other should be a lightweight, smaller version you can take with you if you have to get away. Make a Plan in advance for what you will do in an emergency. Be prepared to assess the situation. Use common sense and whatever you have on hand to take care of yourself and your loved ones.

Develop a Family Emergency Plan. Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so plan how you will contact one another and review what you will do in different situations. Consider a plan where each family member calls, or e-mails, the same friend or relative in the event of an emergency. It may be easier to make a long-distance phone call than to call across town, so an out-of-town contact may be in a better position to communicate among separated family members. Be sure each person knows the phone number and has coins or a prepaid phone card to call the emergency contact. You may have trouble getting through, or the phone system may be down altogether, but be patient. Depending on your circumstances and the nature of the emergency, the first important decision is whether you stay put or get away.

You should understand and plan for both possibilities. Use common sense and the information you are learning here to determine if there is immediate danger. Watch television and listen to the radio for official instructions as they become available.

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Old Fall Creek Station Now Training Station

With change in location of the Fall Creek Fire Station, the building located in Fall Creek proper is being converted to a new purpose. Currently the station houses the district's 1952 Mack Fire Engine and items that are being stored inside. In the near future, the station will be cleaned out of a number of items that have been at the location for a number of years and are of no use to the district.

The district will then repurpose the building and small lot to become a training and storage facility. Two bays of the building will be converted to open area that will house firefighting training aids and props, and the third bay area will utilized as storage for the Mack and other small items.

In addition, the district has budgeted for 2 to 3 metal shipping containers that will be configured to accommodate additional training aids as well as a burn unit that can simulate a small structure fire to allow fire-fighters to practice fire attack techniques and other firefighting skills that they are currently not able to practice.

The entire site will be utilized as the districts main training facility, and will offer firefighters from Lowell as well as our neighboring districts a greater range of realistic fire and rescue props to learn new skills and hone current skills.

Backyard Burn Season Delayed

The backyard burning ban has been extended until October 15th, 2014 with provision for additional delay until further notice. With the extended dry and hot conditions our area has experienced, it has continued to keep fire danger levels in the "High" to "Extreme" ranges.

"For backyard burning to be conducted safely, the weather patterns need to change to the wetter winter model. Until then, we recommend that people cover their burn piles so that it stays dry until burning is permitted," said Jo Niehaus, a Lane Regional Air Protection Agency (LRAPA) spokesperson. "Dry wood debris will burn faster, more thoroughly, and emit less pollutants into the air."

LRAPA will regulate this provision until open burning season begins. A first offense violation of LRAPA's open burning rules may result in a \$500 fine. For more information contact Lane Regional Air Protection Agency at 541-736-1056.
