#### **Open Burning Season Start Delayed until November 1st**

Because of continued dry weather, the open burning season will be delayed until November 1st. Lane Regional Air Protection Agency regulates open burning in Lane County during burn season to minimize impacts of smoke in the local airshed. LRAPA has a Backyard Burning Program to let people know when and if outdoor burning is allowed in their areas. The regulations differ depending upon location, local city and county ordinances and LRAPA rules. Most metropolitan areas are limited to burn season, but the season may very from area to area. In addition, the Fire District may enforce further limitations on burn season as necessary for public safety.

#### **Daily Burning Advisory**

LRAPA provides the community with a daily backyard burning advisory. However, it is the citizen's responsibility to check local regulations regarding their specific area. The Lowell Fire District enforces regulations and codes that assure that all fires are managed in a safe manner to reduce the likelihood of the fire spreading to unwanted areas, while LRAPA enforces the production of smoke generated from open burning.

Generally residents who can burn may burn woody yard debris that has been generated on their own property. They may not bring in materials from other locations to burn. All burning must be constantly attended until extinguished. No burn shall create a public nuisance or hazard. No burn shall contain prohibited materials, including but not limited to, garbage, plastics, wire insulation, asbestos-containing materials, tires, automobile parts, asphalts, petroleum products, treated wood, rubber, or animal remains. Open Burning Letter Permits may be issued in some instances for burning outside the scope of this program. The application for a letter permit must be made in writing to LRAPA using LRAPA's "Request for Open Burning Evaluation" PDF form.

Areas not regulated by LRAPA include: Residential barbecues used for cooking, fires set or permitted by any public agency for weed abatement, fire hazard prevention, safety or fire fighting, Agricultural open burning, open burning permitted under the Forest Practices Smoke Management Plan. #### "What if?"

What if something happens like an ice storm, wind storm, power outage, or flood and you're not with the rest of your family? Will you be able to communicate with them? Will you be able to let them know you are safe? Communication networks, such as mobile phones, and computers could be unreliable during disasters, and electricity could be disrupted causing massive blackouts. Planning in advance will help ensure that all the members of your household, including children and people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs, as well as outside caregivers, know how to reach each other and where to meet up in an emergency. Planning starts with three easy steps: 1-Collect, 2-Share, 3- Practice.

- **1. Collect information:** Create a paper copy of the contact information for your family and other important people/ offices, such as medical facilities, doctors, schools, or service providers.
- 2. Share the information: Make sure everyone carries a copy with them in their wallet, purse, or backpack. If you complete your Family Emergency Communication Plan online at "ready.gov/make-a-plan", you can print it onto a wallet-sized card. You should also post a copy in a central location in your home, such as your refrigerator or family bulletin board.
- **3. Practice**: Have regular household meetings to review and practice your plan. Remember "Practice Makes Perfect". Here are some other pointers when developing your family communications plan: remember text messages may be better that a voice phone call. Text messages require less bandwidth then a voice call. Text messages may also save and then send automatically as soon as capacity becomes available.

Have a paper copy of email addresses, phone numbers and such as computers and phones may be inoperable during long hours of electrical power outages. Batteries don't last forever.

Be familiar with your school's emergency response plan and how you might be informed if schools need to contact you. Discuss these plans with your children and let them know who can pick them up in an emergency. Make sure household members with phones are signed up for alerts and warnings from their school, workplace, and/or local government agencies.

Decide on safe, familiar places where your family can go for protection or to reunite if separated. Make sure these locations are accessible for household members with disabilities or access and functional needs. If you have pets or service animals, think about animal-friendly locations. Identify the follow places: Indoor locations if there are high-wind storms; In our neighborhood locations if you need to leave your home; Outside our neighborhood locations for large scale emergencies.



## City Beat

#### **New City Administrator: Jared Cobb**

Please welcome Jared Cobb, the new City Administrator for the City of Lowell. He will begin work on October 1st.

Jared was born and raised in Palm Harbor, Florida with his parents and a younger sister. He bucked family tradition and went to college at Florida State, instead of Florida, where he earned a bachelor's degree in Economics. At FSU he met a professor who had taught at a renown public administration program at University of Kansas. Having already developed an interest in this area, he was proud to earn a Masters of Public Administration degree with an emphasis in Local Government Administration at KU in 2009. During his last year of school he in-



terned with the City of St. Pete Beach where he gained valuable experience. Unfortunately his graduation coincided with the economic recession and jobs with public agencies were scarce as governments cut staff to save money.

The summer of 2009 he worked as a raft guide while applying for administrative positions and began an internship with The Dalles, Oregon through the rest of the year. In The Dalles he served as the City's grant writer, coordinating with community partners and ultimately securing over \$7.5 million in capital funding. Later, as an intern with the City of El Dorado, Kansas he served as the representative to the Convention and Tourism Committee, managed pasture and hay land leases, and secured a \$170,000 grant from the State Energy Office to fund an Energy Manager position to work with the City. In 2011 he was hired by the City of El Dorado as Assistant Finance Director where he developed the annual operating and capital improvement budget of approximately \$30 million and received the City's first GFOA Distinguished Budget Presentation award.

In 2013 he was hired by the City of Lovington, New Mexico (12,000 population) as the Assistant City Manager/Community Development Director. With the boom in oil, this was a period of rapid growth for Lovington. Jared gained extensive experience as the project manager for the Comp Plan. He wrote the grant to fund the plan, organized the citizen committee, and the plan was adopted in February 2015. When the opportunity in Lowell arose, Jared jumped at it. He enjoys small town life and especially the outdoors. He's looking forward to doing some kayaking, hiking and learning how to fly fish. While recovering from a running injury, he rehabbed on a rowing machine and looks forward to trying that as well. He and his two dogs, Rawleigh and Cori, are settling into a rental home in Lowell so he can get to know Lowell residents and learn what's important to them. He believes engagement with the public and relationships with people are essential to present ideas and possibilities and get feedback.


