# College: It's not a dream....it's a plan.

Lowell Jr./Sr. High joined the more than 100 high schools and community-based organizations around the state in hosting College Application Week events Nov. 15-18. According to the "40-40-20" goal approved in 2011 by the Oregon State Legislature and Governor Kate Brown's Proclamation, November was designated OREGON GOES TO COLLEGE MONTH.

Students enjoyed a variety of college/career readiness activities, including a special assembly for 7-9<sup>th</sup> graders where they received 21<sup>st</sup> Century certificates, GEAR UP gifts, and refreshments. The entire student body focused on college, career learning activities, earning tickets each day for answering questions about scholarships, grants, loans, Lowell graduation credits, and Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA); wearing college, Lowell pride, and GEAR UP gear; culminating on Friday with an all-school raffle drawing and college game show, making students eligible for food, gift certificates, and college swag.

On Thursday seniors applied to over ten different colleges and universities, finished preparing Oregon Promise and other Oregon grants and scholarships and were treated to a catered meal.

Principal Kay Graham, Aspire Coordinator Karen Cardwell, and GEAR UP Coordinator Jeanie May agreed that the week achieved its purpose: To assist seniors when they apply to a post-secondary educational option, including certificate programs, two-year degree programs, and four-year programs and to build awareness for all students that many options exist for them after they graduate from Lowell High School.

# New Lights Installed at Covered Bridge

Over the past few years, staff has struggled to keep up with changing the lights at the Lowell Covered Bridge. The goal was to change the color arrangement once a month and, with ten (10) light fixtures, that meant nearly one hundred twenty (120) bulb changes a year. The job required a ladder, two people, and a hazardous step over the guard rail.

Staff knew there had to be a better solution. After researching options, the Public Works Department identified and purchased ten (10) new smart LED bulbs from a small start-up company named *ilumi*. These replaced all eighty (80) halogen

floodlights. Coined as the world's smartest light bulb, each light has a programmable computer chip that is controlled with a smartphone app using Bluetooth wireless mesh technology. The new bulbs are dimmable, color-tunable to almost any color on the spectrum, and produce a variety of lighting effects. They're also energy efficient.

Staff installed the new lights in September. While there was admittedly a brief learning curve and a couple of technical bugs to work through, changing the color arrangement is now much safer and more efficient. In fact, it couldn't get any easier. All that is required is one person, one smartphone, and one walk through the Lowell Covered Bridge.

#### Let's Talk Candle Fire Safety

Candles may be pretty to look at but they are a cause of home fires — and home fire deaths. Remember, a candle is an open flame, which means that it can easily ignite anything that can burn.

Candles and kids sometimes don't mix. Think about using flameless candles in your home. They look and smell like real candles. Never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle. Keep matches and lighters up high and out of children's reach, in a locked cabinet. "CANDLE WITH CARE" Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep. Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn.



IF YOU DO BURN CANDLES, make sure that you... Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily. Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface. Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame. Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container. Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home. Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.
