

## **City Administrator Annual Report**

We've all heard the saying, "You have to learn to walk before you can run." Successful organizations take care of the basics before they achieve greatness. They build a foundation by hiring the right people, managing finances effectively, and establishing a system to plan for continual improvements.

For 2016, we focused on these three key areas. The following is a review of our major accomplishments:

### **Human Resources**

- A performance evaluation system was implemented. Staff are now evaluated on eleven (11) job-related criteria and develop objectives for the upcoming year. The tool is designed to communicate job expectations, promote accountability and encourage professional development.
- The Accounting Clerk position was left unfilled, with the job duties reassigned to the City Clerk and a new contract accountant. This saves the City over \$20,000 per year in personnel expenses.

#### Finance

- The City adopted fiscal evaluation criteria, which are used to determine the overall health of our finances. We established minimum cash reserves of 17% of planned operating expenditures. This conforms with professional standards established by the Government Finance Officers Association.
- The annual budget was restructured, with the budget developed by department (i.e., Parks) instead of by category of expenditure (i.e., Personnel Services). This conforms with professional standards established by the Government Finance Officers Association.
- A contract accountant was hired. The position assisted with the annual audit and implemented new procedures to resolve prior year audit findings, increase transparency, and safeguard our assets.

# FROM THE LOWELL FIRE DISTRICT

#### Fire District's ISO Rating Improves

The Insurance Service Office, Inc., (ISO) is a company that assesses, evaluates and classifies fire service agencies for the purposes of providing statistical data to insurance companies for underwriting fire insurance policies. ISO is an independent company that serves insurance companies, insurance regulators and others by providing information about risk. ISO collects information about municipal fire suppression efforts in communities throughout the US. In each of those communities, ISO analyzes the relevant data and assigns a Public Protection Class, (PPC) grade – a number from 1 to 10. Class 1 represents an exemplary fire suppression program, and Class 10 indicates that the area's fire suppression program does not meet ISO's minimum criteria. Lowell Rural Fire Protection District completed this survey in October of this year.

Prior to this evaluation, the classifications were as follows: structures within City limits of Lowell Class 4; structures outside the city limits but within five miles of a fire station Class 8B, structures within fire district but greater than five miles from a fire station Class 10.

The new classifications effective March 1, 2017 will be as follows: structures within City limits will remain a Class 4; structures outside the city limits but within five miles of a fire station become a (new) Class 4; structures outside the city limits greater that five miles from a fire station but within seven miles of a fire station will become a (new) Class 10W; structures greater than seven miles from a fire station remain a class 10. The change to a rural Class 4 should afford significant insurance premium savings for property owners in that area, and those in the 10W class should also see some slight savings depending on the insurance carrier. The bottom line is that rural residents should see a reduction in fire insurance premiums.

ISO's, Public Protection Classification Program (PPC) plays an important role in the underwriting process at insurance companies. Most insurers in the US utilize the ISO, PPC information as part of their decision-making when deciding what business to write, coverages to offer or prices to charge for personal or commercial property fire insurance. Each insurance company independently determines the premiums it charges its policyholders. The way an insurer uses ISO's information on public fire protection may depend on several things – the company's fire-loss experience, ratemaking methodology, underwriting guidelines, and its marketing strategy.

The PPC program evaluates communities according to a uniform set of criteria, incorporating nationally recognized standards developed by the National Fire Protection Association and the American Water Works Association. A community's PPC grade depends on:

- Needed Fire Flows, which are representative building locations used to determine the theoretical amount of water necessary for fire suppression purposes.
- Emergency Communications, including emergency reporting, telecommunicators, and dispatching systems.
- Fire Department, including equipment, staffing, training, geographic distribution of fire companies, operational considerations, and community risk reduction.
- Water Supply, including inspection and flow testing of hydrants, alternative water supply operations, and careful evaluation of the amount of available water compared with the amount needed to suppress fire up to 3,500 gallons per minute.

Emergency Communications accounts for 10% of the total classification, Fire Department accounts for 50% of the total classification and Water Supply system accounts for 40% of the total classification.

## As Colder Weather Arrives Use Heating Appliances Wisely

With the onset of colder weather, citizens should ensure that all their heating appliances are in good working order. Have woodstoves, fireplaces, and chimneys, cleaned and inspected by a qualified specialist annually and before using them for the winter. Portable space heaters also pose a high risk. Use these with extreme caution and follow all space heater safety tips.

#### **Portable Space Heaters**

\* Only use portable space heaters with an automatic shut-off so if they're tipped over they will shut off. \* Give heaters space. Keep at least three feet of space between the heater and combustibles such as furniture, curtains, bedding, and papers.

\* Check heater electrical cords. Inspect for cracked or damaged cords, broken plugs, or loose connections. Replace before using the space heater.

\* Plug portable electric space heaters directly into a wall outlet. Never plug them into a power strip or extension cord.

\* Never allow children to play with, or around a heater.

\* Turn heaters off when not in use, before going to bed, or when leaving the room.

#### **Electric Baseboard and Wall Heaters**

\* Be aware of electric baseboard and wall heaters. These heaters are thermostatically controlled and may turn on without warning when temperatures drop.

\* Give these heaters space. Just as with portable space heaters, keep at least three feet of space between your baseboard/wall heater and combustibles items such as furniture, curtains, bedding, and papers.

#### **Fuel Burning Space Heaters**

\* If using a fuel-burning space heater, make sure it is designed for indoor use. Read all manufacturer instructions and make sure it is properly vented.

\* Allow the heater to cool before refueling. Refuel outside or in a well-ventilated area.

\* If you smell gas, do not light the heater, operate any electrical switches, or thermostats. Leave the building and call 9-1-1, the fire department, or the gas company.

#### **Smoke Alarms and Home Escape Plans**

\* For increased protection, have working smoke alarms on every level of your home (including the basement), in each bedroom, and outside any sleeping area (hallways).

\* Test smoke alarm batteries at least once a month by pushing the test button.

\* Look at the date on the back of your smoke alarm, if it's 10 years old or older, replace it. If there is no date, it is more than 10 years old and should be replaced.

\* Ensure you have a home fire escape plan and practice it with your family.

#### **Carbon Monoxide Dangers**

\* Carbon monoxide poisoning can be fatal if not detected early.

\* Home heating and cooking equipment that burn fuels such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane are sources of carbon monoxide.

\* Make sure you have working CO alarms on every level of your home, in every bedroom (sleeping areas), and outside each sleeping area.

\* Test and maintain your carbon monoxide alarms according to the manufacturer's instructions.


