The SNP Snack Program transitioned into the CACFP Supper Program in Feb. 2015.

Lowell students participating in the School Nutrition Program during school days are projected to receive over 100,000 breakfast and lunch meals this school year — almost double the numbers just three years ago! Food Services Director, Billy Reid, has done an excellent job of serving more meals while remaining well below budget for expenditures. The increased participation of students has stretched our kitchen and cafeteria space to the point where future facility plans include expansions of both areas to better serve our students and continue to increase efficiencies.

Lundy Elementary Awarded \$1.3 Million in State Funds to Make Seismic Improvements

The size and scope of the District's facility improvements list makes it impossible to complete all the work without additional support. The District has worked to get as much done as possible given available funds. In 2015, we received a \$1.2 million Seismic Grant for Lowell High School. That grant will pay for the installation of shear wall panels for stability and improvements to wall surfaces, sound acoustics, lockers and flooring. These improvements will be made this summer.

We're pleased to announce another success: last week Lowell School District was awarded \$1.3 million to make seismic improvements to the Lundy Elementary School gym as well. This work will add shear wall panels for stability and will also include acoustic sound ceiling panels, new wall surfaces and will address asbestos-related issues. We're excited to make these critical improvements and will continue to make the most of local and state funding. Success Keeps Pouring In for Lowell Music



An open house and "Meet the New Chief" get together is being planned for June to give the community an opportunity to meet your new Fire Chief. Look for further information on this event in the June Bridge.




May Is Best Month To Help Prevent Summer Wildfires

Residents play a major role in protecting their lives and property. Your home ignition zone extends up to 100 feet – and it's quite common to have neighbors whose home ignition zone overlaps yours. Once a structure is engulfed in flames, it could ignite other structures located less than 100 feet away. In addition, many communities have commonly owned property, including natural or wooded areas that can pose fire risks to all. This means that to be most effective, neighbors need to work together and with their fire service partners to achieve greater wildfire safety.

Together, community residents can work with fire agencies and elected officials to accomplish the following:

- » Ensure that homes and neighborhoods have legible/clearly marked street names and numbers
- » Know "two ways out" of the neighborhood for safe evacuation during a wildfire
- » Create phone and text trees to alert residents about local fires
- » Sign up for emergency notifications through Lane County "Alert Me" program
- » Talk to your Homeowner Association (HOA) to make sure you are in compliance with existing community rules or regulations on vegetation management and construction materials and if they are "Firewisefriendly"
- » Engage with the fire district officials on how they can work with you and your neighbors, and participate in the "Ready, Set, Go!" program
- » Participation in the Firewise Communities/USA Recognition Program can provide the community with a risk assessment and action plan that will help residents work together annually to make where they live a safer place.

Push-Button Pedestrian Signs Installed

The pedestrian signs at the intersection of North Shore and Moss Street and the intersection of Pioneer Street and Main Street have been completed. The signs are highly reflective, brightly colored and solar powered. When pedestrians hit the push button, LED lights flash, alerting motorists that someone is about to step into the crosswalk.

When used properly these signs greatly enhance pedestrian safety. Caution is still required, however, when crossing any public street. Pedestrians should push the button on the sign base, wait for the lights to activate, and look both ways prior to crossing.



Online Bill Pay a Success

Last September the City started accepting utility payments online. We are pleased to report that this program has proven successful. The service provides customers with multiple, convenient payment options, while also reducing City postage, printing, and labor costs. Enrollment and use of the service has increased each month since implementation. Through April 27, 126 customers have paid online this month.

Powered by Invoice Cloud (<u>www.invoicecloud.net</u>), this service provides the following benefits:

- Monthly water consumption and billing history.
- No signup cost.
- No transaction fees.
- You may choose to eliminate paper invoices to reduce clutter and help the environment.
- You have the option to pay immediately, schedule a payment or sign up for Auto-Pay.
- Access, view and pay your bill at your convenience through the web or by text using an electronic check or credit/debit card.
