At Lowell Jr./Sr. High School, our dedicated staff is committed to every student achieving academic excellence and personal success. Through our rigorous and relevant curriculum, our school strives to prepare every student to be successful for college and career readiness.

During the 2016-2017 school year, Lowell Jr. /Sr. high school improved the school program by adding AP Government, AP European History, and AP Statistics to the LHS curriculum. General Biology was added as a College Now course and a Spanish instructor was added to the teaching staff. This year, with the addition Computer Science, Art, Physics, and enhanced AP Literature, LHS will continue working to raise academic achievement in literacy and math. Other enhancements to our school program include:

- Maintaining one-to-one technology with every student having access to school computers
 - at school and for home use
- Removal of sports and activities fees so all students can participate in extra-curricular activities and the addition of a dance club
- Increased college visitations at all grade levels and an improved our college and career center
