

City Administrator Annual Report

The focus of the City Council and staff is developing an organization that is successful over the long-term. This means building a solid foundation by investing in staff training and development, managing finances effectively, and establishing a system for continual improvements.

In 2016, we focused on creating a positive culture of staff training, financial health, and the development of a strategic plan. This past year our organization worked on plan implementation. The following is a review of our major accomplishments:

Planning

• Received a \$1,000 grant to make a minor update to the Land Development Code.

Police

• Conducted a review and developed a report on available options, costs, and funding to increase public safety services.

Information Technology

- Installed a dedicated server for use with the new financial management system.
- Approved a contract for a new City website to provide additional tools for public engagement and community marketing.

Code Enforcement

- Hosted a community clean-up day, providing two large containers for the disposal of large household items.
- Disseminated community outreach materials to educate the public and increase voluntary code compliance.
- Developed a Yard of the Month Program to recognize the efforts of residents who take pride in their home and landscape. The program is scheduled to start in May 2018.

LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move ...

Community Members,

First, I would like to thank you for the support you provided in approving the recent \$4 million-dollar bond for the District. This is both an exciting time and a challenging time for the staff, due to work associated with selling the bonds and developing the plans for the \$8 million-dollar building program. Our intent, throughout this process, is to communicate with the community and staff to ensure you know the why, what, how and when of our building program. We will post our Lowell School District Design and Construction Schedule on our website, if you want the details. We also intend to provide a month to month update for your information, via the Bridge.

In summary, the process has begun with walkthroughs of the buildings with the design staff (architect, engineers, and specialists) to ensure we create efficient and effective building plans. Throughout the process, we will be seeking advice from "user groups" and a "local expert advisor group." The user groups include representatives of Lundy Elementary, Lowell High School, Principals, Athletic/Performing Arts, Maintenance/Operations, and Food Service. Those involved within the user groups will be posted on our website. The Local Expert Advisor Group consists of local construction experts including Jerry Valencia from Bridgeway Construction, Chad and/or Richard Lybarger from Brothers' Plumbing, Jason Pickett parent and lead for school construction in Springfield School District, Jason Prenevost from J&K Electric, Brian Chittim from James Heating, John Murray from Lane Electric, Tim Gribble from Preferred Construction and Jack Viscardi or designee from 2G Construction.

In January we will be holding our first user group and expert advisor meetings. The focus will be on providing input on what the users would wish to have happen and from the experts what will be practical to happen. We have enough money to do anything we want, not everything we want. Thus, the advice received will be critical to address the first priority needs, which are focused on modernizing the infrastructure of the two buildings, and then the building of a new gym and creating of the multi-use facility for Lowell High.

Changes in Building Leadership in the 2018-2019 School Year:

It has been a pleasure serving as the principal of Lundy Elementary for the past two years. Due to the demands of the building projects coming next year and with the addition of our two new charter schools, our progressive School Board has elected to have me serve as Superintendent full time beginning July 2018. Serving full time as the Superintendent will ensure the building projects run smoothly and Lowell maintains excellent academic progress, facility upgrades and strong fiscal responsibility. Jessica Edgerton, Lowell's current Learning Director, will assume the role of Lundy Principal in July of 2018. Ms. Edgerton is a wonderful elementary school leader. She will continue to build upon the teaching and learning improvements that have been made at Lundy and will take the elementary school to the "next level" as we strive to become the best district in our state!

While Dr. Hanline is retiring at the end of the school year, he has also been asked, and has agreed, to serve as a consultant to the district. Currently he serves as a consultant to many other school district superintendents on the west coast. I will certainly benefit from his mentorship as I continue to develop in my superintendent duties and responsibilities.

At Lowell Jr./Sr. High School, Ms. Kay Graham has chosen to stay at least one more year in our school district to ensure that the Jr./Sr. High School maintains high standards in student academic growth and continued improvement in student graduation rates. She, along with Ms. Edgerton, will continue maintaining Federal and State grants. Amber Hansen will continue her expanded role as Special Education Director of the Lowell School District. Currently she is the longest serving Special Education Director in Lane County. Her leadership and work continue to be invaluable to the district and to the surrounding Lane County Schools.


New Club Welcomes All "Nerds"!

<u>Library</u>

- Purchased three new PCs for the computer lab, which includes Office 365.
- Developed webpages with resources to help teach patrons computer skills, assist with job searches, and provide books for preschool age youth.
- Coordinated the Summer Reading Program with the Lowell School District. The Program was hosted at Lundy Elementary and scheduled after the Summer Recreation Program and lunch service. Average attendance increased from 5 to 20 kids per day.

Finance

- Developed a 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan.
- Started implementation of a new financial management system.
- Improved the budget process and document to conform with standards for the Government Finance Officers Association Budget Award.
- Stabilized the Sewer Fund and exceeded the fiscal evaluation criteria for all operating funds, which requires minimum reserves of 17% of budgeted expenditures.

Economic Development

- Received a \$30,000 grant to develop a Downtown Master Plan.
- Partnered with Oregon RAIN to provide technical assistance to local entrepreneurs.
- Created a Tourism Program to assist with marketing the community and beautification projects.
- Developed a Community Grant Program to stimulate and assist local non-profit organizations and businesses with community projects, economic development activities, and events.
- Approved Home, Developer, and Business Development Guides. Guides include introductory information for building a home in Lowell, developing a subdivision, and starting a business.

Public Works

- Started a Green Waste Collection Site for residents to dispose of yard waste.
- Implemented an inspection and maintenance program of City facilities.
- Implemented a routine maintenance program for vehicles and equipment.
- Installed lighted pedestrian crosswalk signs at the intersections of Moss and North Shore, and Main and Pioneer.
- Continued to improve operations of the Water Plant, which led to recognition by the Oregon Health Authority as an "Outstanding Performer".
- Purchased new water meters and automated reading system. Upon full implementation, meters will be read by a handheld device and uploaded to the Utility Billing system.

<u>Parks</u>

- Completed a concept plan for Paul Fisher Park.
- Installed new safety signage around Rolling Rock Park exhibits.
- Planned and coordinated the 11th Annual Holiday Bridge Lighting.
- Started monthly maintenance and safety inspection program for all parks.
- Replaced bark mulch at Rolling Rock Park, Paul Fisher Park, and medians.
- Received a \$32,000 grant to update the Parks and Recreation Master Plan.
- Assisted with the relocation of the Dexter Lake Farmers Market from the Dexter State Recreation Area to Rolling Rock Park.
- Hosted a Solar Eclipse Watch Party at Rolling Rock Park, which included music, live NASA feed of the event, free solar eclipse glasses, and refreshments.

Fire District Open House/Community Dinner Success

The Fire District would like to thank all those that attended the Open House/Community Dinner on December 9th. We hope everyone got enough to eat and had a good time visiting the fire station and visiting with neighbors. It is estimated that approximately 187 folks attended the event. Again, thank you to all who attended.

Are You Prepared?

Flooding is the most common natural disaster in the United States and can happen anywhere. How to Prepare for a Flood explains how to protect yourself and your property, and details the steps to take now so that you can act quickly when you, your home, or your business is in danger. Here are some things to consider with winter storms and possible flooding. Flooding is an overflowing of water onto land that is normally dry. Flooding may happen with only a few inches of water, or it may cover a house to the rooftop. Flooding can occur during any season, but some areas of the country are at greater risk at certain times of the year. Coastal areas and inland regions of the Pacific Northwest are at greater risk for flooding during Winter storms and during heavy spring rains mixed with snow melt runoff. Flooding can happen in any U.S. state or territory. It is particularly important to be prepared for flooding if you live in a low-lying area near a body of water, such as a river, stream, or culvert; along a coast; or downstream from a dam or levee. Flooding can occur in several ways, including the following.

- Rivers and lakes cannot contain excessive rain or snowmelt.
- Excessive rain or snowmelt cannot be fully absorbed into the ground.
- Waterways are blocked with debris or ice and overflow.
- Water containment systems break, such as levees, dams, or water or sewer systems.
- Strong winds from tropical storms or hurricanes cause a storm surge by pushing seawater onto land.

The speed and duration of flooding can vary significantly.

- Flooding can occur slowly as rain continues to fall for many days. This type of flooding, sometimes called a slow-onset flood, can take a week to develop and can last for months before floodwaters recede.
- Rapid-onset floods occur more quickly, typically developing within hours or days. These types of floods usually occur in smaller watersheds experiencing heavy rainfall, particularly in mountainous and urban areas, and the water usually recedes within a few days.
- Some rapid-onset floods known as flash floods occur very quickly with little or no warning, such as during periods of extremely heavy rain or when levees, dams, debris jams, or water systems break. Densely populated areas are at a high risk for flash floods. In urban areas, flash floods can fill underpasses, viaducts, parking structures, low roads, and basements.

The strong winds of a tropical cyclone or hurricane can push large amounts of seawater up onto the land, causing a storm surge. A storm surge combines with the ocean's tide to produce a storm-tide surge. Storm-tide surges have been registered as high as almost 35 feet above normal sea level and can cause significant flooding across a large area. This generally occurs over a short period, typically 4 to 8 hours, but in some areas, it can take much longer for the water to recede to its pre-storm level.

The physical destruction caused by flooding depends on the speed and level of the water, the duration of the flood, terrain and soil conditions, and the built environment (e.g., buildings, roads, and bridges).

- Flooding can cause fatalities and serious injuries for people who are trapped or swept away by wading in, driving through, or boating across floodwaters.
- Transportation routes, power, water, gas, and other services may be disrupted.
- Commercial supplies and government support systems may be temporarily unavailable.
- Drinking water supplies and wells may become polluted.
- Floodwaters can cause erosion, which can damage roads, bridge structures, levees, and buildings with weak foundations, causing their collapse without warning. The floodwaters may carry the worn-away mud, rocks, and other sediment.
- Landslides and mudslides can occur.
- Even a few inches of floodwater in a home can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage.


