

# **More Honors and Special Concert for Lowell Band**

Save the date! The Lowell HS Concert Band will be featured in a special performance this spring, as part of the annual Eugene Symphonic Band Outreach Program. The concert will take place at LHS at 7pm on Sunday, March 11th. The Eugene Symphonic Band (ESB) is an exemplary community ensemble, filled with outstanding adult musicians and led by Dr. Rodney Dorsey (head of Bands and Instrumental Studies at the University of Oregon). The ESB selects one local high school each year for this program, which provides special instruction to our students from Dr. Dorsey and ESB musicians. The culminating event is a joint performance of the two ensembles - clearly one of this year's can't-miss concerts! Lowell is the first small school (3A or smaller) to receive this honor.

In other good news, LHS also had five students selected for this year's Willamette Valley Honor Band, an all-star high school group organized by Scott McKee of the American Band College and Western International Band Clinic. This special ensemble, filled with the best high school musicians in our area (from primarily 5A and 6A schools), meets weekly during the winter, and will present public concerts on March 1st (7pm, Willamette HS) and March 4th (4pm, Springfield HS). Fisher Schescke, and Nicky Sotomayor are joined by sophomore Taysian Williamson and junior Ian Sotomayor for this special honor. Ian was also selected as soloist and "first chair" trumpet out of all participants!

# LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move...

### **Bond/Building Program Update**


The \$4 million local bonds are scheduled to be sold during the second week in February. We provided a presentation to Moody's, a bond rating firm on January 24<sup>th</sup>. We are working hard to receive at least an A- rating. The higher the rating, the less interest and the more premium we will receive.

We have had two "User Group" meetings in January on the 5th and 23rd. On the 5th, we asked the user groups to share everything they would like to see in the building program. From the meetings came thoughts of enlarging the planned wrestling room and expanding the presentation center and stage, and, we received input into the elementary office restructuring from both MVA and district leaders. On the 23<sup>rd</sup>, we shared with the user groups the price associated with the "wish" list, which was around \$11.3 million. Now we start the process of trimming down, since we have only \$8.3 available. The two highest priorities, the security/safety improvements and the modernization of our infrastructure (water pipes, electrical, sewer pipes, heating and air conditioning) came in around \$4.4 million. The Priority three projects of the gym, cafeteria/presentation center, and the wrestling room made up the rest of the \$11.3 million.

On February 6<sup>th</sup>, we will be working with the "Local Expert Group" to see if the experts can find ways to produce the product for less money. Following that meeting, we will be begin the task of prioritization of the use of the funding.

#### **Lowell Drama Program**

LHS Drama is excited to not only be bringing a hilarious comedy to the community this February, but also to be showing off our newest upgrades to both our theater space and our production level. The first upgrade to our theater is newly built partial walls, separating the audience area from the backstage costume and makeup area and the side corridor. Our second big upgrade to the theater is newly built risers, allowing for much better viewing of our performances for all audience members! We also built new makeup counters and installed mirrors and vanity lights for the actors.



As for the productions themselves, with the support of the Lowell, Fall Creek Education Foundation, LHS Drama has been able to purchase over \$400 worth of stage makeup. This not only allows for all students, despite financial status, to have their own Ben Nye Student Makeup Kit, it also allowed us to purchase special effects makeup like stage blood, bruise cremes, and scar gel, for our upcoming production, "10 Ways To Survive The Zombie Apocalypse", as well as for future productions. #### **Pet Licensing and Frequently Asked Questions**


The City of Lowell Revised Code (LRC) requires that anyone who owns, keeps, possesses, or has control of a dog six months of age or older must have the dog licensed and vaccinated against rabies. Cats allowed to be at-large must also be licensed, vaccinated against rabies, and altered.

A pet license identifies and protects your pet in case it becomes lost. You are required to keep your license updated. Pet licenses provide the following benefits:

- A license tells everyone that your pet is not a homeless stray.
- When licensed, found pets can be quickly reunited with their owner.
- When found, your licensed pet will typically receive a longer holding period at the shelter.

To obtain a license, you will need to provide the following:

- Your name, address and telephone number.
- A current rabies vaccine certificate, good for the entire licensing
- period.
- A certificate of sterility if your pet has been altered. This will reduce your license fee.
- Microchip information (if applicable).
- Pet license fee.



#### Frequently Asked Questions

What should I do if my pet becomes lost? Contact City Hall. The City doesn't have a shelter; however, residents sometimes report lost pets. You should also contact the 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue Shelter in Eugene at 541-844-1777.

## My neighbor's dog won't stop barking. Is there anything the City can do?

Staff encourages residents to first contact your neighbor. Sometimes they are unaware of the problem, particularly if it occurs while they're away at work. If this isn't an option, you should submit a Complaint Form to City Hall. Staff will review the complaint, contact the property owner, and attempt to resolve the issue. Barking or howling for more than 15 minutes is a violation of the code and may result in a citation.

There's a dog running at-large in my neighborhood. What should I do? Contact City Hall. Staff will attempt to identify the dog and its owner. Dogs that

are unlicensed and/or running at-large may be subject to a citation.

What should I do if I, or someone I know, gets bit by a dog? If the bite breaks the skin, professional medical advice should be sought to evaluate the risk of rabies or other infections. You should also contact City Hall to complete a bite report and provide the time, date, and place of the incident. This will allow staff to complete a follow-up investigation and ensure the animal has a valid license and is vaccinated against rabies.

There are loose cats in my neighborhood that have become a nuisance. Is there anything I can do, or the City can do to resolve the problem? Property owners may humanely capture and detain a cat located on their property for up to 72 hours if the cat has taken up residence; kills, menaces or endangers other animals; or is sick, injured, or a health hazard. LRC 5.227 provides several requirements. Please review these requirements or contact City Hall before taking any action.

# FROM THE LOWELL FIRE DISTRICT

#### **Volunteer & See What You Can Achieve**

Have you ever thought about becoming a Firefighter or EMT? The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District provides Fire Protection to a district of 23 square mile around Lowell, Unity and Fall Creek. The District includes rural, residential, business and forest lands as well as recreational areas. We are always looking for volunteers to help protect our community.

The wide variety of protected lands and structures within the District requires our volunteers to be well trained in many different suppression techniques under a number of different conditions. This variety of experiences and training can prepare our volunteers for varied specialties within the fire service or give them a well-rounded base knowledge for other types of employment if they so desire.

The surrounding area is home to many outdoor recreation areas that all come with natural features that require unique skills and knowledge to perform rescues. Our volunteers receive training in rope rescue, water rescue and vehicle extrication. Learning new and valuable rescue techniques is an important part of every volunteer's experience with the District.

Providing Emergency Medical Services to our District patrons and visitors is one of the primary services offered by the District. Volunteers are encouraged and financially supported in gaining medical certifications and licensing including Emergency Medical Responder (EMR), Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Advanced/Intermediate EMT and Paramedic levels. A variety of backgrounds and levels of training enable District personnel to provide caring quality patient care to those needing help.

#### What do you have to do to get involved?

Contact District members by either dropping by the main station in Lowell or calling us at 541-937-3393. Visit us on Facebook or on the web at www.lowellfiredistrict.org. No experience is necessary. All levels of experience are welcome. As long as you have a good attitude and are willing to learn, we will teach you what you need to know to be successful. If you live in the Fire District, initial training takes 5 to 6 weekends to complete. Following your initial training, attending weekly drills and responding to calls (about 4-5 hours per week) is all that is required. We also have an Intern Program for folks that do not live in the District but want to volunteer. You pick your hours for the most part. Start when you can and the District will try to accommodate any schedule that helps support responses and training.


