Downtown Master Plan Public Meeting November 14

On Wednesday, November 14 the City will host a public meeting in the Lowell Fire Department Community Room from 5:00-7:00 p.m. to review the first draft of the Downtown Conceptual Plan. Residents are encouraged to attend, learn about the plan and provide feedback. Light food and refreshments will be provided.

Public Safety Survey Open Through November 30

The Lowell City Council is conducting an evaluation of our law enforcement services. This includes reviewing available crime data, potential service alternatives, and soliciting public input. A survey has been included with your recent utility bill. Please take a few minutes to review, complete, and return this short five (5) question survey. Results will be reviewed by the City Council at the December 4 Work Session and posted on the City's website at <u>www.ci.lowell.or.us</u>.

Backyard burning in Lowell closed October 31 and will not reopen until next March. Residents are encouraged to drop off any remaining yard waste at the Green Waste Facility located at 240 South Moss Street. The facility is open the last Saturday of every month from 10:00-Noon and by appointment. Materials are accepted at no charge. Proof of residency is required, and may be confirmed with a recent water, electric, cable or telephone utility bill.

2018 General Election

Ballots were mailed to eligible voters starting October 17. After you have filled out your ballot, be sure it is physically received no later than 8:00 pm on November 6. <u>Postmarks do not count</u>. You can return your ballot through the mail, take it to your local elections office, or drop it in one of the many drop boxes throughout the state (there's one at City Hall, 107 East 3rd Street). To track your ballot or to find additional drop boxes, you can visit <u>www.oregonvotes.gov/myvote</u>.

- Ordinance 297—Water Leak Adjustments—approved the first reading of Ordinance 297 as written— an Ordinance Amending Lowell Revised Code, Section 4.153.

• Approved a settlement agreement with Hatton Roofing and Heater Construction in the amount of \$330,000.

• Approved a motion to allow the City Administrator to negotiate to acquire 53 E. Main Street. All motions were approved 5-0.


Annual Community Dinner Scheduled for December 8th

Candles may be pretty to look at but they are a cause of home fires — and home fire deaths. Remember, a candle is an

IF YOU DO BURN CANDLES, make sure that you... Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily. Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface. Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame. Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container. Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home. Have flash-lights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.

November is Check Your Smoke Alarm Month


November is the month that everyone should take the time to check their smoke and carbon monoxide alarms for proper operation and to ensure the batteries are good.

Newer smoke alarms are required to have 10-year batteries in them, and alarms over 10 years old should be properly disposed of and replaced with the newer models. In addition, smoke alarms should have the "hush" feature so that when a false alarm does occur, the alarm can be temporarily silenced to allow the inadvertent (burnt toast) smoke to clear.

Properly working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms can save lives by alerting you to a fire or to poisonous carbon monoxide in your home. Almost 70% of failures are due to missing, disconnected or dead batteries!
