### LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move...

Dear Community,

Is anyone ready for some actual construction to take place? I sure am! We completed our preconstruction walkthroughs with the General Contractors and are ready to break ground soon. I can't believe all the planning is finished and now it is time to start this great process that will allow our schools to rise to a whole new level.

A lot has happened in the last two weeks with the bid numbers coming in, selecting the Contactors and recommending to the board our action plan. Our recommendation included selecting Bridgeway Construction for all of our elementary school work and Bineham Construction for the Jr/Sr High School renovation and new gymnasium. I am looking forward to working with both companies and seeing the results that we have awaited the last 1-1/2 years.

I want to thank our School Board for having the vision to take this district to the next level. Our plan is to complete everything that was on the list, in order of priority, including:

- Campus Security (fencing, cameras, doors, etc.)
- Electrical and Plumbing infrastructure throughout both schools
- New Gymnasium and converting our current gym into a cafeteria / performing arts venue

In addition to the above, the Board accepted our recommendation to use some reserves we have been saving up the last couple of years to build a new wrestling room connected to the gymnasium. This decision will impact the reserves to the tune of \$685,000 and I commend them for seeing the need to complete this part of the project even though bond dollars won't cover it. Although the next few years will be tight with regard to the budget, this project is well worth it and will benefit students and the community for many years to come.

Although staff will be inconvenienced, they will be able to work during the construction. The Elementary school portion should be done around August with the remainder to be completed in summer of 2020. We can promise that all involved with this project will work tirelessly to ensure we not only get the most bang for our buck, but that everything is done in accordance with the extremely high standards we have come to expect from the district.

We will have much more information coming out next month regarding the building program and the progress that has been taking place. As you see trailers parked on campus, tractors begin to move ground, buildings start to take shape and organized chaos throughout the district, just know that it will all be for the greater good of the community. Also, I want to give a special thank you to the City of Lowell. Their staff have been instrumental in helping out with this whole process and continue to work with us to ensure that all i's are dotted and t's are crossed!

Arshad Wahedna said: "Humans are like an ever flowing river of fresh water. We stagnate if we stop progressing." I can guarantee, the next year will be the opposite of complacency and stagnation as we keep our firm vision of progression in all aspects. The "idea" that started in 2016 is coming to fruition and not only are we on the move, we are well on our way!



#### **Lowell Music Keeps On Rolling**

This spring has been another amazing season of off-the-charts success for the musicians of Lowell High School. In March, the LHS Band competed in the OMEA District 12 and Willamette Valley Concert Band Festivals, once again receiving the highest scores of any participating ensemble (regardless of school size) and making a fourth straight OSAA State Finals! They will play for a State Championship on Friday, May 10th, at Oregon State University's LaSells Stewart Center. LHS performs at 9:45am and would love to have supporters in the house! Tickets are \$8 at the door.



Not to be outdone, the LHS Choir followed suit in their own district festival on April 3rd, also outscoring all competitors (regardless of school size) and making a third straight OSAA State Finals. OSU hosted this event on April 29th, after this publication went to press; huge congratulations to Lowell's singers for their successes! Of special note this year, Lowell was the only 2A/1A school in the state -- public or private -- to qualify for both Band and Choir State Finals. In addition, with the LHS Brass Ensemble competing for an OMEA Chamber Ensemble State Championship on April 26th, Lowell completed an incredible "hat trick" of qualifications that has likely never before been achieved by a public school of our size! Truly amazing stuff.

Other events of note in April included Lowell hosting the annual Mountain West Music Festival on April 12th. Our amazing community and school staff put together a fantastic day for 300 students from nine different schools. Students performed for their peers and received expert instruction from University-level music directors, and the event culminated in a well-received public concert which featured all students performing together! This event also featured our Lowell Junior Choir and Intermediate Band, who both set the bar for all junior high performers in attendance.

Members of the Junior Choir were also invited to perform at this year's Metropolitan Choral Festival at the Hult Center on April 23rd. They sang wonderfully in a combined choir with students from other local junior highs, and were then treated to performances by more than a dozen high-school choirs. Among them was our own LHS Choir, whose moving performance was the talk of the festival.

As for Lundy Elementary, save the date for Wednesday, May 29th. The spring musical, "The Science of Stuff," debuts at 7:00pm in the LHS Gymnasium. We'll see you at the show!

#### City of Lowell Places 2<sup>nd</sup> in Water Competition

On April 17, 2019 the City of Lowell took part in the 12<sup>th</sup> Annual American Water Works Association Cascades to Coast Best Drinking Water Contest at the Willamette Event Center in Albany. Water samples were scored on a scale of 1 to 30 by a panel of five judges in three categories, which were odor, flavor and aftertaste. All entered water samples were set at the same temperature and sampling was done randomly using the blind taste test method. The City of Lowell placed 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 11 water systems entered, followed by Bend in third place and first place went to the Springfield Utility Board.

#### **Lane County Opens Locations for Storm Debris Disposal**

Recognizing the need for residents to have locations to dispose of storm debris caused by the February snow event, Lane County is opening four locations for free disposal of downed trees and limbs in areas that were the hardest hit by the storm and are not served with local wood recovery/recycling options. Three transfer stations (Rattlesnake, Marcola, and Oakridge) and one temporary site in the Fall Creek area will be open on three Saturdays for disposal from private residences. Hours of collection will be 8:30 a.m.—4: 30 p.m. on April 27, May 4, and May 11.

### FROM THE LOWELL FIRE DISTRICT

The last couple months have brought some severe weather to our area. These events have given us the insight to see areas that we can improve. The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District will be working with the City of Lowell as well as the Lowell School District to see how we can provide better service in the future in case of any other event.

The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District has nearly completed Station 2 garage. We are looking forward to hosting a Grand opening in late June. We are currently working on the staffing for Station 2.

The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District is working on putting together a Public CPR Course. The class will take between 4 – 5 hours and will cost \$70 per person. This is the up-to-date AHA CPR class contact the Lowell Rural Fire Protection District 541-937-3393 to get your name on the list. The AHA CPR card is good for two years.

The Lowell Fire District is committed to help provide the tools, information and encouragement to prepare for wildfire and reduce their risk of wildfire in our community. Here are some steps to take around your home:

- 1) Remove dead or overhanging branches. During the windy conditions that exist during a wildland fire, flames, sparks and firebrands could travel from the tree to the roof of a structure.
- 2) Remove leaf, moss and needle accumulation from your yard. Leaf and needle accumulation provide fuel for a wildland fire.
- 3) Remove leaf, needle and moss clutter from your roof and gutters. During a wildland fire, flying embers could ignite this material on the roof and/or in the gutters.
- 4) Remove tall, dry grasses. Tall, dry grasses provide a path for fire that can lead directly to your house.
- 5) Remove "ladder fuels". Prune tree limbs so the lowest is between 6' 10' from the ground. Fire burning through tall, dry grass could ignite these limbs and climb to the top of the tree with relative ease.
- 6) If you have one, check your generator, water system and hoses to be sure they are in good repair. A wildfire could affect electrical power to homes. Refuel garden equipment carefully. Yard equipment needs annual maintenance and proper fueling. Hoses develop leaks and deteriorate with age and exposure. During wildland fire season, fuel your lawn mower properly --away from dry, flammable grasses.
- 7) Prune bushes and shrubs regularly. Remove excess growth as well as dead leaves and branches to decrease their flammability, and the threat they could pose during a wildland fire. Dispose of cuttings and debris promptly, according to local regulations.

#### Join the Grange Amateur Radio Emergency Network

When disaster strikes, cell phones go down. We saw this in the recent Snowpocalypse, when even the town of Lowell was out of cell phones for almost a week, and out of power for five days. Communications are essential, but we almost never have it when we really need it.

Amateur Radio is the go-to, stand-alone communications network when cell phones go down, and when a disaster occurs. For over 75 years, Amateurs have stepped up to the task of providing life-saving communications for disaster areas worldwide, and thousands of lives have been saved because word could get out on radio systems.

Amateur Radio is an exciting hobby as well, and over 822,000 Amateur Radio operators in the United States enjoy communicating with their own radio, and connecting with their community and the rest of the world.

Amateur Radio is an ideal communications system for Granges and their members. Rural communications during emergencies is essential, and Grange members are perfect for becoming a resource and connection for the community around them. Stuck because of snow or flood or fires? Need a snow plow or chainsaw down the road, but can't call with a phone? No problem! Just call for it on the radio!

You need to get trained and licensed to operate an Amateur Radio and become a HAM. Licensing is only 15 dollars, and free training can be done over a weekend. You get a unique call sign, and an official FCC license. You can then operate a radio on certain frequencies allocated to Amateurs for use, and be part of the Amateur Radio Emergency Network.

We can ask Lane County Sheriff Search and Rescue Amateur Radio Operators to be part of the network, as well, so we have direct access to officials for assistance and information during a natural disaster. But we can't solely rely on the authorities to help us. We need to be able to help ourselves and our neighbors, especially here in rural areas. We need a radio communication network that works when all other communication is down.

For those interested in being part of the Grange Amateur Radio Emergency Network, come to the Lowell Grange Open House on May 18, from 12-3. We will have a radio set up and are going to be talking about Amateur radio at 12:30. There will be a free lunch, too.
