Lowell Graduates Earn Scholarships for College

On June 14th, 37 seniors graduated from high school and took home over \$387,000 in scholarships! Among the awardees were Kasey Erwin and MacKenzie Smith who received \$5,500 and \$4,500 respectively from Lane Electric Cooperative. Kasey will use his scholarship to help fund his dream of becoming a journeyman lineman. MacKenzie will attend Lane Community College in the fall to pursue her dream of becoming a veterinary technician.

MVA Students in Washington D.C.

Many of the Mountain View Academy 7th and 8th graders went to Washington D.C. in May. They spent five very full days visiting historical sites, memorials, government buildings and monuments. These 20 students and five staff members had an incredible time learning about our nation's history, seeing significant documents in person and walking where our forefathers walked many years ago.

Highlights of this trip include walking through George Washington's home at Mount Vernon and seeing his tomb as well as watching the Changing of the Guard at Arlington National Cemetery and visiting the Air & Space Museum.

BookFest Comes to Lundy Elementary

In Lane County, only 47% of students are reading proficiently by 3rd grade. Research shows that providing children with a handful of self-selected books at the start of summer can help to maintain reading habits and abilities over the summer, which in turn helps more students read at grade level. When kids read at grade-level in 3rd grade, they're more likely to graduate high school on time.

In order to increase reading scores before students enter third grade, Connected Lane County and United Way of Lane County partnered together on BookFest. The program focuses on four core values:

- Access By providing the event to students while in school we are removing barriers to accessing books.
- Book ownership—Many families have limited resources to purchase books. Regardless of a family's financial constraints, we want to help children build their home library.
- Choice—Self-selection of books is an important component in getting children excited about and engaged with literature.
- Quantity—Students receive 7 books to give them increased opportunities to engage with books and foster reading outside of school.

Over 9,000 books and \$7,900 were donated through community book drives and sponsorships. 1,057 Kindergarten, 1st and 2nd grade elementary school students at 9 Title I schools chose 7,399 books to take home with them to encourage reading over the summer. Additionally, parents/caregivers were provided information on how to support their child's reading during the summer and free/low-cost resources to prevent the summer slide.

New City Hall Hours

Annual Water Report

The Federal Safe Drinking Water Act requires the City of Lowell to provide an annual report with information about the quality of the community's drinking water. The annual report includes information about possible water contaminants and Lowell's source of drinking water.

Utility Rate Adjustment

The Lowell Municipal Code establishes water and sewer utility fees and authorizes the City Council to change the fees by Resolution. As with other goods and services, the cost of personnel, materials, services, and capital projects continues to increase. The City of Lowell Budget Committee recommended and, the City Council approved, a 3% rate increase to keep pace with annual inflation and avoid a larger future rate increase.

What does this mean to you as a customer?

- The monthly base water fee will increase from \$24.59 to \$25.33. The variable rate will increase from \$4.93 to \$5.08 per 1,000 gallons up to 5,000 gallons of consumption. For over 5,000 gallons, the rate will increase from \$6.21 to \$6.40 per 1,000 gallons.
- The monthly sewer fee will increase from \$58.51 to \$60.27.

FROM THE LOWELL FIRE DISTRICT

The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District has hired two additional employees that will be starting July 1, 2019. These two additional, plus one that we have, will be working a 48/96 shift. This will bring a 24-hour paid staff to the Lowell Fire District. The staff will be working on training our members on a daily basis as well as being available for calls. We believe that this change will help to continue providing a great service to our community members.

We have entered into regulated use for the summer. We will continue to update our website at www.lowellfiredistrict.org to inform the community on what the current restrictions are.

We are looking at providing CPR classes for community members. Please call the station if you are interested in taking a class and we will get you on a list for the next available class.

This summer we would like to remind everyone of some water safety. Please make sure that you have a life vest when going out in a boat. We have had a couple of incidents already this year when boaters did not have them and needed them. If you go out in a boat on the river, please make sure someone knows where you are travelling and when to expect you to return.

We will be managing the BBJ Parade route again this year. Please be aware that we will be shutting roadways for the parade participants. We will open roadways as soon as possible while keeping the parade group safe. Please plan for possible delays. Then please join us at our booth this year. Our Oregon State Fire Marshall will try to join us this year to provide some educational items for the public. We will be answering questions around volunteering as well as fitting for bicycle helmets if they are needed.

Dexter Lake Farmers' Market

OSU Extension Service Master Gardeners are available to answer gardening questions at Dexter Lake Farmers Market in Lowell this summer. Master Gardeners answer can address planting, fertilizing, vegetable gardens, diagnosing plant diseases, insects and much more.

I had a helpful discussion with them about my hollyhocks. I grew up loving these tall plants with flamboyant flowers which flourished in Eastern Washington where we lived. But after several years my hollyhocks in Dexter developed dry looking, rusty spots in patches on the larger leaves What might be wrong?

I learned this is a common problem in Western Oregon due to our rainy climate. My childhood climate was much dryer and the hollyhocks grew without problems! I followed the advice of the master gardner for a simple non-toxic treatment that worked. I removed the affected leaves and burned them, then applied onion garlic spray to the plants. Now my hollyhocks look fine and are starting to bloom.

Talk to the Master Gardeners and bring your gardening questions, along with samples or pictures of your plant prob-

lems to Dexter Lake Farmers market. They will be there on Sunday July 7 and Sunday July 21. Dexter Lake Farmers Market is open at Rolling Rock Park in Lowell from noon until 4 PM through the end of September, excepting BlackBerry Jam weekend.

Master Gardeners also staff a plant clinic and answer phones Monday-Thursday, 10 a.m.-1 p.m. and 2-5 p.m. (541-344-0265) at the OSU Extension Service office 996 Jefferson Street in Eugene. Call or come by with your gardening questions. You can also email your questions to Master Gardeners at lanemg@oregonstate.edu.
