Attendance: The “Every Day Matters” Campaign to Reduce Chronic Absenteeism

Last year our high school set attendance goals to improve daily attendance. I am happy to report that we improved our “regular attenders” rate by 9%. But, we can do even better! This year we want to improve our attendance rate by another 10% and with your help, we can accomplish this. Please help our students get to school on time and community members...if you have a chance to talk to school age students, stress to them that “Every Day Matters”!

Research shows that after 10 days of absence from a school year, students begin to fall behind their peers academically. **Additionally, if students miss more than 10% of their school year they are considered chronically absent.** When you chat with your kids, grandkids, nieces, nephews and neighborhood students, take time to ask the students in your life how they are doing with their attendance. Your interest in the topic will go a long way to help them understand that “every day matters”!

Good Sportsmanship and HB 3409

Sadly, over the last few years, there has been an uptick of really inappropriate spectator behavior during sporting events around the nation and even in our own state. Racial slurs, name calling, and verbal and physical aggression in sporting events have led to the state requiring OSAA (Oregon Student Activities Association) to mandate some acceptable behavior policies at sporting events and stiffen up complaint processes and sanctions when spectators and teams become abusive and derogatory.

I wish I could say our teams and spectators are always polite and non-abusive but... we too occasionally have less than stellar moments! We, like nearly every school, do have some work to do in this area. I think we can all agree that we support the basic notion that competitions should be held in supportive environments so all can enjoy the games. Poor spectator behavior likely will result in removal from the sporting event. In the coming weeks, school staff and student leaders will be working to help our student fans become shining examples of great sportsmanship! We ask for the community to lend a hand in this effort by setting a good tone and a good example of sportsmanship at our school athletic events. Thank you in advance for your help in this area.

FEMA Grant Application

This past month staff attended a half-day scoping meeting with our FEMA representative to start the process of applying for disaster relief funds as a result of the February snow storm. Our FEMA representative explained the types of cleanup and damages that are eligible for funding, which includes debris removal, emergency protective measures (i.e. generators), building and equipment repair. Notably, snow removal is ineligible because the disaster was not declared as a snow event (yes, we know, if the snowpocalypse wasn't a snow event...then what is?). Staff is working on a grant request for tree and debris removal, electrical repairs, rental equipment, generator fuel, replacement of the lift station generator, and the purchase of the dump trailer used at the Green Waste Facility. FEMA will reimburse up to 75% of eligible project costs.

Code Assistance Grant Awarded

The Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD) has awarded the City of Lowell a Code Assistance Grant. This grant will be used to implement the recently adopted Downtown Master Plan and update the Land Development Code. The Lane Council of Governments will serve as the consultant and will be paid directly from DLCD for their work.

SafeRoutes Safe Routes to School Grant

Oregon Safe Routes To School



Earlier this year Lane County, the City of Lowell and Lowell School District partnered to apply for Safe Routes to School (SRTS) funding to make significant streetscape and safety improvements to North Shore Drive and Moss Street. Unfortunately, the grant project was not funded. Staff was recently informed, however, that non-infrastructure SRTS funds have been secured for a coordinator dedicated to providing bicycle and pedestrian safety in rural Lane County. This is a new program and both the Lowell School District Superintendent and I are proud that our District was selected to serve as the pilot. The pilot program also significantly improves our chances at future SRTS infrastructure funding for downtown streetscape, pedestrian, and bicycle improvements. More information will be provided in the next few months as the program is rolled out. Stay tuned!

September at Dexter Lake Farmers Market, Rolling Rock Park in Lowell

Dexter Lake Farmers Market has had a lovely season since opening in June. We feature a steady supply of vegetables, a variety of berries, and other fruits as they ripen. The first fall grapes came in on Sunday August 25! Great for eating fresh or juicing. A steam juicer makes it easier with seeded varieties.

Food for Lane County will have a booth on Sunday Sept. 1 and Sunday Sept. 15. They represent a network of 157 programs and social service agencies, including our local food banks in Dexter and Lowell. According to their website, Food for Lane County is dedicated to eliminating hunger by creating access to food. The Oregon Food Bank website, (one of the Food for Lane County partners), states that Oregon has a "food insecurity" rate of 14.6%. Food insecurity is defined as being without access to a sufficient quantity of affordable, nutritious food. An estimated 260,000 Oregonians attend a food pantry monthly. Come discuss this issue with the Food for Lane County representatives at Dexter Lake Farmers Market.

Also present at the farmers market on Sept. 1 and 15 will be the Lane County Master Gardeners mobile food clinic. These folks are valuable information sources for any plant related problems. They have been at the market twice a month all summer, and on some Sundays they have not been well utilized. Make a note of your plant problem and plan to discuss it with them. They can help create access to healthy local food in your own back yard!

We at Dexter Lake Farmers Market also work to make local food and handcrafts more available! We are open from noon until 4 PM through the last Sunday in September. We appreciate those who have purchased our products and who have brought their own products in to sell during the 2019 season. Thank you all very much.

Fire District Reminds Everyone to Be “Wildfire Safe”

Yes, Fire Season is once again upon us and the Lowell Fire District would like to remind everyone that there are a number of ways property owners and tenants can reduce the likelihood of wildfires. There are also a number of ways to reduce the chance of your home or out buildings falling victim to a spreading wildfire should one occur.

To help prevent wildfire damage create a “DEFENSIBLE SPACE” around your home by keeping grass and shrubs cut to a height of less than six inches around your structures. Keep grass and shrubs well irrigated and green to make them less susceptible to fire. Keep combustibles away from structures, keep fir needles and branches clear of roofs and gutters. And remember, outdoor burning is prohibited this time of year due to fire danger.

For more information about preventing wildfires and making your structures wildfire safe, visit the district website or go to www.firewise.org. An additional resource is the Oregon Department of Forestry for property owners living in forestlands. Keep your home wildfire safe.

Summer Water Safety Reminder

Whether at home or enjoying our local waterways, it is always important to keep safety in mind when in or near water. Drowning can happen at any time of year, but be especially cautious during the summer months when drowning incidents can increase by as much as 89% as compared to the rest of the year.

When the weather turns warm, as it is now, everyone naturally wants to be in or around the water to help stay cool. Hanging out at the pool or the lake on a hot day is a great way to beat the heat. For people between the ages of 5 and 24, drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death.

It doesn't have to be that way, though. Most water-related accidents could be avoided by knowing how to stay safe and following a few simple guidelines. Learning how to swim is essential if you plan on being on or near water. Many organizations provide swim instruction to folks of all ages, check to see what classes are available in our area.

Here are some Swim Smart Ideas:

- Alcohol and Water DO NOT MIX. Anytime you are on or near the water, stay sober. A leading cause of boating accidents is due to alcohol being on board. And I don't mean just on board the boat. Just like driving a car, drinking alcohol and driving a boat can cause disaster, as well as land you in jail.
- “Buddy up!” Always swim with a partner, every time — whether you're swimming in a backyard pool or in a lake. Even experienced swimmers can become tired or get muscle cramps, which might make it difficult to get out of the water. When people swim together, they can help each other or go for help in case of an emergency.
- Get skilled and be prepared. Learning some life-saving skills, such as CPR and rescue techniques, can help you save a life. Many organizations offer free classes for both beginning and experienced swimmers and boaters.
- Know your limits. Swimming can be a lot of fun but if you're not a good swimmer or you're just learning to swim, don't go in water that's so deep you can't touch the bottom and don't try to keep up with skilled swimmers. That can be hard, especially when your friends are challenging you — but it's a pretty sure bet they'd rather have you safe and alive.
- Swim in safe areas only. It's a good idea to swim only in places that are supervised by a lifeguard. No one can anticipate changing currents, sudden storms, or hidden underwater dangers. In the event that something does go wrong, lifeguards are trained in rescue techniques. Recognize that swimming in an open body of water (like a river, lake, or ocean) is a lot different than swimming in a pool. You need more energy to handle the currents and other changing conditions in the open water. Some areas with extremely strong currents are off limits when it comes to swimming. Do your research so you know where not to swim, and pay attention to any warning signs posted in the area.
