


Making community connections

Fire Prevention Week October 6-12

The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District would like to remind everyone about keeping your home fire safe. During this year's Fire Prevention Week, we would like to point out that Kitchen Fires are the number one cause of residential fires in Oregon. Here are some tips and reminders about preventing kitchen fires.

Many families gather in the kitchen to spend time together, but it can be one of the most hazardous rooms in the house if you don't practice safe cooking behaviors. Cooking equipment, most often a range or stovetop, is the leading cause of reported home fires and home fire injuries in Oregon as well as the United States. Cooking equipment is also the leading cause of unreported fires and associated injuries.

Lowell School District Active Shooter Drill — October 18th

On Friday, October 18th, all Lowell School District Staff will participate in training that will further enhance and refresh our previous training in ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) active threat protocols. Most staff received initial training in ALICE over the last few years and we are working toward making the protocols a part of our emergency drills. The training will be conducted by our partners at the Lane County Sheriff's Office and the ALICE training team.



In short, using the above ALICE method, we will teach our staff and eventually students that in the event an armed intruder/active shooter evades their secure area they:

- 1. Listen carefully to the location and type of event.
- 2. Get to and/or remain in a secure area until it is safe to evacuate.
- 3. Should an armed intruder/active shooter enter their immediate area, apply skills to Distract, Confuse and Gain Control.
- 4. As soon as it is safe to do so, Evacuate.

During the training on October 18th, as a part of increasing our understanding of how to recognize threats and respond accordingly to them, the community may hear external public address announcements or periodic sounds of **blank gunfire** exhibited by law enforcement in a safe environment. A reminder, these are drills conducted in a controlled environment with safety at the forefront of the operation.



Safe Cooking Behaviors:

- Keep Things Away from Heat
- Keep Kids Away from Cooking Areas
- Prevent Scalds and Burns
- Watch What You Heat
- Know What to Do if There is a Fire

It's a recipe for serious injury or even death if you were to wear loose clothing (especially hanging sleeves) while cooking, walk away from a cooking pot on the stove, or leave items that can catch fire, such as potholders or paper towels, around the stove. Whether you are cooking the family holiday dinner or a snack for the children, practicing safe cooking behaviors will help keep you and your family safe.

Choose the Right Equipment and Use It Properly:

- Always use cooking equipment tested and approved by a recognized testing facility.
- Follow manufacturers' instructions and code requirements when installing and operating cooking equipment.
- Plug microwave ovens and other cooking appliances directly into a wall outlet. Never use an extension cord for a cooking appliance it can overload the circuit and cause a fire.

If You Have A Kitchen Fire:

- If the fire starts in a pan, don't pick up the pan and move it.
- Slide a lid over the pan to smother the flames and turn off the burner.
- Let the pan cool down completely before moving it or taking off the lid.
- Never pour water on a grease fire; it can splatter the grease and spread the fire.
- In the event of a fire in the oven or microwave, turn off the appliance and keep the door closed

When in doubt, get out! Close the door behind you when you leave to help contain the fire. Call 9-1-1 after you leave the house. If your clothes catch fire: Stop, Drop to the floor, Cover your face with your hands and Roll side to side until the fire is out.

Smoke Alarms are a Must:

• Make sure your have working smoke alarms on every level in your home, outside each sleeping area, and in each bedroom. Remember to test them regularly.

Outdoor Burn Season Begins in October, Weather Permitting

With the return of our great Oregon rain, the fire danger has been dramatically reduced for our area. And with the coming of fall the Back Yard Burning Season will soon open. The Back Yard Burning season usually begins October 1st, weather permitting.

Back Yard Burning and the smoke that is produced, is regulated by Lane Regional Air Protection Agency (LRAPA). All fire safety or safe burning practices are regulated through the local Fire District/Department and the burning of logging slash is regulated through Oregon Department of Forestry.

The Lowell Rural Fire District does not required permits to burn authorized materials, however, burning is only allowed on designated burn days as authorized by LRAPA, and in a safe manner as authorized by the Fire District. Burning of tree and shrub trimmings and yard debris generated on the property of the fire are permitted. The burning of building materials, construction or demolition debris, or processed wood and paper is prohibited under LRAPA regulations.
