

November is Check Your Smoke Alarm Month

November is the month that everyone should take the time to check their smoke and carbon monoxide alarms for proper operation and to ensure the batteries are good. Newer smoke alarms are required to have 10-year batteries in them, and alarms over 10 years old should be properly disposed of and replaced with the newer models. In addition, smoke alarms should have the "hush" feature so that when a false alarm does occur, the alarm can be temporarily silenced to allow the inadvertent (burnt toast) smoke to clear.

Properly working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms can save lives by alerting you to a fire or to poisonous carbon monoxide in your home. Almost 70% of failures are due to missing, disconnected or dead batteries!

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
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LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move ...

Update on Downtown Improvements

Earlier this year the City wrapped up the Downtown Master Plan. Since completion, staff and the City Council have been working to turn the community's vision (below) into reality by taking the following specific actions.

"A quaint downtown with a central park, multi-story mixed use buildings, a variety of homes, and wide sidewalks connecting to Dexter Lake's recreational opportunities."

- Received \$100,000 grant to grind and overlay Main Street from Pioneer Street to Moss Street. Engineering for the project has been completed and the project is planned for Spring 2020.
- Purchased JW Kingdom Hall to serve as the permanent Library and temporary City Hall, with future City Hall to be located on the same site. Both buildings will serve as prominent anchors in downtown.
- Completed conceptual plans for Library improvements at the former JW Kingdom Hall and future City Hall at the corner of Pioneer Street and North Shore Drive.
- Purchased three lots on Main Street to expand and reconfigure Rolling Rock Park from a linear to a square-shaped, central park to better support downtown activities and events.
- Partnered with the Lowell Fire District to conduct a Burn to Learn exercise on the former house located at 53 East Main Street.
- Awarded a landscape architecture contract on October 15 to develop construction plans for the first phase of Rolling Rock Park improvements, including irrigation, regrading, tree and turf installation.
- Awarded a landscape architecture contract on October 15 to develop a conceptual design for the extension of Cannon Street (Main Street to North Shore Drive) to serve as a minor through street and festival area for events.
- Partnered with Lane County and the Lowell School District to receive a Safe Route to Schools Grant to develop the County's first rural pedestrian and bike safety program.

Lowell City Council Actions

This report of actions taken by the Lowell City Council is a regular feature of this newsletter and is provided to inform citizens of recent decisions made by the council.

At the September 17th regular meeting session, the following actions were taken:

• The Parks and Recreation Committee awarded Rodney Neff of 470 D Street September Yard of the Month.

Lowell City Council Actions—continued

- Wastewater Treatment Plant Blower Replacement—An increase in the quote for a replacement resulted in the Council to authorize a not-to-exceed amount of \$8,500 (up from \$7,500) for the purchase, installation, and testing of a new blower for the wastewater treatment plant.
- Approved Resolution 727—A Resolution Proclaiming the Week of September 1 through 7 Be Known as Home Inventory Week.
- Approved \$2,000 for sponsorship of the 2019 Lowell School District Summer Recreation Program.
- Authorized the City Administrator to sign the intergovernmental agreement in support of a Community Development Block Grant from the 2019 Community Development Block Grant Program administered by the Oregon Business Development Department, Infrastructure Finance Authority.
- Appointed Lon Dragt for Position 3 to the Blackberry Jam Festival Committee.

Motions were approved 5-0.

At the October 1st work session, the following topics were discussed:

- Advanced Metering Infrastructure—an overview of the existing system, financial justification, advantages and disadvantages for new systems, and benefits for the city were presented.
- Resolution 728—Employee Compensation Adjustments—information was presented on the new employee six-month review, local area wage compensation comparison and request for wage adjustment.
- Informal Solicitation-Tree Removal and Disposal Service was discussed as well as an update on the work with FEMA.
- Informal Solicitation-Landscape Architecture Services Two proposals received for the Rolling Rock Park and Cannon Street landscape architecture services were discussed.
- FY 2019-20 Capital Improvement Plan was reviewed.

At the October 15th regular meeting session, the following actions were taken:

- The Parks and Recreation Committee awarded Raymond & Phyllis Cross of 165 N. Pioneer Street Yard of the Month for October.
- Approved Resolution 728: A Resolution Making Employee Compensation Adjustments for Fiscal Year 2019-20.
- Awarded landscape architecture projects, phase 1 and 2, to Dougherty Landscape Architects in an amount not to exceed \$23,730.
- Motions were approved 3-0, Angelini and Dragt absent.
- Authorized the purchase of a sewer line inspection camera for an amount not to exceed \$10,000.
- Approved the 2019-20 agreement for law enforcement services with the City of Oakridge.
- Motions were approved 4-0, Dragt absent.

With the coming holiday season, the Lowell Rural Fire Protection District would like to say "Thank You" for all the community support we receive by providing a holiday dinner to the community.

This year the dinner will be held from 4:00 pm to 6:00 pm at the main fire station in Lowell. A full Turkey dinner with all the fix'ns will be served along with station activities for everyone, young and old alike. Stop by for a visit with friends and neighbors and have a nice holiday meal besides. Activities include a tour of the station and district equipment, coloring contest for the kids, and door prizes.

New Fire Engine!

Lowell Fire District has ordered the District's first custom-built HRE Structural Engine. This apparatus is being built specifically to the needs of our community. Delivery is expected in July/August 2020. Thanks to the community for your support of the Lowell Fire District.

Is Your Chimney Clean and Ready for Winter?

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves and other fuel-fired appliances as primary heat sources in their homes. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the fire risks when heating with wood and solid fuels. Nationally heating fires account for 36% of all residential home fires in rural areas every year. Often these fires are due to creosote buildup in chimneys and stovepipes. All home heating systems require regular maintenance to function safely and efficiently. The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District encourages everyone to practice the following fire safety steps to keep those home fires safely burning.

Keep Fireplaces and Wood Stoves Clean

- Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist.
- Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations and flammable materials.
- Leave glass doors open while burning a fire. Leaving the doors open ensures that the fire receives enough air to ensure complete combustion and keeps creosote from building up in the chimney.
- Close glass doors when the fire is out to keep air from the chimney opening from getting into the room. Most glass fireplace doors have a metal mesh screen which should be closed when the glass doors are open. This mesh screen helps keep embers from getting out of the fireplace area.
- Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces that do not have a glass fireplace door.
- Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- Keep air inlets on wood stoves open, and never restrict air supply to fireplaces to prevent creosote buildup.
- Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves.
- Never use flammable liquids to start a fire.
- Use only seasoned hardwood. Soft, moist wood accelerates creosote buildup. Never burn trash or debris.
- Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke.
- When building a fire, place logs at the rear of the fireplace on an adequate supporting grate.
- Never leave a fire in the fireplace unattended. Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container outside your home when cleaning the firebox.

Each year fire claims the lives of 3,500 Americans, injures 18,300, and causes billions of dollars worth of damage. People living in rural areas are more than twice as likely to die in a fire than those living in mid-sized cities or suburban areas. The neglect and misuse of wood stoves, portable space heaters and kerosene heaters are especially common risks in rural areas.
